



Dear AHOC members, Geoff Scott asked me to circulate a note about fire dangers related to Li-ion batteries

Last week a good friend of mine living in Trentham returned home after a few days away only to find that there had been a significant fire inside his three car garage. A large amount of damage had destroyed much of his memorabilia including plastic signs and other items in his workshop. His three restored classic cars were covered in black soot but, fortunately, were spared further damage. Shannon's investigators arrived the next day and discovered that the fire had started in an area that included a number of Li-ion batteries, one or more had exploded and started a severe fire. The only good news is that the fire in the garage, that is under the roofline of his house, did not spread further as the flames shooting up the wall had melted a plastic water pipe that extinguished the fire. The one thing that really surprised me was that the batteries had been fully charged several weeks earlier but were no longer connected to chargers and had apparently spontaneously ignited. We should all re-think how and where we charge and store this type of battery in our homes or businesses? Regards, Geoff Scott President AHOC Vic

Further to Geoff's note, here are some guidelines on battery use, storage and care from the web:

- **Keep cool:** storage should be cool, dry and not in direct sunlight. Even when in use, do not leave devices/batteries in direct sunlight, and do not place chargers or batteries on a heater or radiator.
- **Charging:** when charging, keep the charger and battery in a cool and well-ventilated position, not in a cupboard, box or covered up.
- **Well-ventilated:** li-ion batteries require a well-ventilated environment, so they don't overheat. This also prevents thermal runaway.
- **Secure:** keep cells safe and free from impact damage.
- **Fireproof Storage:** if you have a metal cabinet, this could be used for storage of batteries (when not in use), as long as it is well ventilated. In this way any battery fire may be contained.
- **Disposal:** always take batteries to an official disposal site (generally available at: Bunning's and other hardware stores, some supermarkets and at council refuse centers). Do NOT put them in rubbish bins.
