

#### **TIMKEN**


From Missouri to Mars
A Century of Leadership in Manufacturing
By Bettye H. Pruitt

Published in 1998 514 Pages

The Timken family lived for centuries as farmers in Germany near the city of Bremen. Jacob Timken and his wife, Trine, were independent farmers who had one daughter and six sons. Trine died in 1837 at only 46 years of age. Their second youngest son was Henry, and in 1838, at the age of 57 years, Jacob decided to emigrate to America. Henry was a typical seven-year-old farm boy when the family travelled by ship to America.

Jacob purchased a farm in Missouri and developed it. In 1839, Henry and his brothers attended a country school, and at 16 years of age, Henry left school and obtained an apprenticeship in St Louis in 1847 as a journeyman carriage-maker and mechanic. Ultimately, Henry married Fredericka Heinzelmar, and with the financial help from his father-in-law, set up his own quality carriage-making business.

In 1854, when Henry began experimenting with ball bearings on his quality carriages, he found they wore out very quickly. He then determined that roller bearings were much better because of the heavy load of a quality carriage. Henry also developed the Timken Cross Spring for carriages, which he patented and developed. Altogether, Henry had a total of 14 patents, including two for tapered roller bearings.



During 1887, at 56 years old, he retired from the carriage business, with his two sons Henry and William taking over the day-to-day running of the business. Henry spent his time improving the design of their carriages. Henry finally developed tapered roller bearings for his carriages, and on 15<sup>th</sup> December 1899, a new business was developed – "The Timken Roller Bearing Axle Company" – which was the official beginning of the Timken Company of today.

Henry died in 1909 before the new Company completed its first decade. His two sons successfully developed this important company to become a global organisation, and a leader in two key industries – tapered roller



bearings and alloy steel production. The Company was a major force in the early automotive supply industry. The St. Louis Car Company was the first automobile to use Timken tapered roller bearings on their production line. The Timken Company purchased a 1904 St Louis roadster to restore for their centennial activities in 1999.

Timken developed into one of the large enterprises that made America an economic and military super-power, and the American Corporation a model for business organisations in the decades after World War 2.

Little has been written about the bearing industry, yet anti-friction bearings are critical components in virtually all types of machinery. A central thread in the Company's history is the long stream of process and product development that has made the Timken bearings a high-performance component in much of the most advanced equipment of our age. Timken bearings are used in the high-speed printing presses that produce our newspapers; our modern cars and trucks we drive; the giant construction machinery that builds our roads; the planes and high-speed trains we rely on for business and vacation travel. The Company's combination of alloy steel making and precision manufacturing is unique in the world-wide industry.

Of course, Timken opened their factory in Ballarat in 1957, as well as plants all over the world. In 1998, the Timken Company had 55 plants, and more than one hundred sales, design, and distribution centres in 25 countries on 6 continents. Timken is the world's largest manufacturer of tapered roller bearings and seamless mechanical steel tubing.
