
If you are like me, I have multi-focal spectacles. Great in many circumstances, but not so good in some others.

Talking about your health and safety, it's also appropriate to consider your road safety, and safely keeping your assets in your Wallet/bank/cellar/garage, and not pay fines to consolidated revenue (what a misnomer).

So I thought I would provide a direct copy (current at July 2022), from the Road Safety Road Rules 2017.

The improvement in this legislation is that, in many cases, it is now accompanied by coloured diagrams.

Firstly, the most basic of Road Rules, that also in the past also applied to pedestrians on a footpath.

#### ROAD RULES IN VICTORIA – KEEPING LEFT

#### Division 2—Keeping to the left

#### 129 Keeping to the far left side of a road

 A driver on a road (except a multi-lane road) must drive as near as practicable to the far left side of the road.

Penalty: 3 penalty units.

Multi-lane road is defined in the dictionary.

(2) This rule does not apply to the rider of a motor bike.

Note

Motor bike is defined in the dictionary.

I bought mine with a huge pile of bits from a bloke in Fairfield about 1968-9?

I was driving my Ruby which was starting to get a bit wobbly so once I got the roadster done (not restored just done up, but quite nicely) I took the motor out of the Ruby....I think ....and the rego plate and applied for a change of body style from sedan to roadster with Vic Roads, swapped the plates and drove the roadster which went well, no hood though.

I sprayed it Dulux enamel black guards with Zenith blue body, looked good.

I put the very high price of \$350- on it at the time....in The Age Saturday.

I had a Saturday morning job directing cars into parking at the newly opened Doncaster Shopping town and a couple came to see the car in the garage at my parents, polished, front out looking good. The young woman fell in love with it at first sight and my mother told them where I was and what I looked like.

They came up and found me and gave me a deposit.

When I got home Robert McDermott who lived down the road in North Balwyn came up laughing at my outrageous price. He'd owned an Austin since he was 9 and I'd bought my Ruby when I was 16 for £10.

He said ...\$350- that's ridiculous or something....and I said . "It's been sold!"

Anyway, I thought your car looked splendid in the calendar photo.

Ps I did Matric at Balwyn High. There was a girl there called Annette Shearer...any relation? The brakes weren't too good in Aristotle. To stop in a hurry I had to put on the hand brake, pull back on the steering wheel as I pushed down on the foot brake. That flexed the chassis which caused the front doors ( well only doors !) to fly forwards, so if I had passengers I'd tell 'Em to hang onto the doors when we needed to brake hard !

Another quirk was that there were no panels over the inside rear wheel arches . If I went around a corner too hard and for too long ( eg Great Ocean Road going to Lorne) the rear tyres would rub against the metal

arches and get really hot burning the legs of the back seat passengers.

I always wanted a Chummy but the Ruby turned up so I bought it. As it turned out that was probably the best car for me at that time. You could put roof racks and hence surfboards on the roof. Sort of lock the doors so you could leave a guitar and your stuff in the car while you were at the pub.

There was quite a large gathering at Hammills to see the Austins (and others) off to Mt. Gambier. Ten Austins were to make the trip; Graeme Logan; Athol Lamont; Roger Oakley; Ken Innes-Irons; Ken Logan; Russell Curtis; Chris Athey; Noel Clarke; Robert Humphreys; Tony Johns; and their various crews. Hoel Clarke's saloon had to be towed to the start after ignition trouble, but this was soon repaired. Jetting off at 12.45am through the wilds of Footscray, we soon settled down to a steady 40 mph. First casualty was Noel Clarke again, when his throttle linkage came adrift, but this was soon rectified. It had not taken long to establish the in-effectiveness of standard Austin lights on a trip like this. At Geelong we invaded a cafe for hamburgers etc, whereupon the owner did more business in 20 minutes than he usually did in a week. And what a motley looking crew he had to serve too. 'Raffles' Lamont quickly repaired a puncture here and took off in hot pursuit.

Petrol stops were made at Colac (where it started to rain) and Camperdown (where it was still raining). It was between these towns I discovered that to drink a cup of coffee in a saloon such as Noel's, you only place ½" of liquid in the cup, not fill it, as evidenced by my coat and jeans. About 20 miles out of Warrnambool, we stopped with the sole intention of obeying nature's call. You've never seen so many cars stop to give the mechanical assistance we didn't need. And with their headlights on full too. Shortly after Rob Humphreys had engine trouble, which was diagnosed as bearings, but was later found to be a broken compression ring. He was towed by Stewart Brown's Land Rover which is fitted with all mod cons including T.V. for relaxation. The Rover has enough gauges on the dash to shame a light aircraft.

At Warrnambool we stopped for breakfast and petrol at a Shell Cafe and the poor woman had to drive off for three assistants to feed the multitude. From here, I had a drive of Noel's "Ambulance" which was now running like a charm thanks to carby tuning by Ken Innes Irons. We were sitting on 5G-55 mph. At this stage, Chris Athey, who was full of confidence "because he had passed a Jag on the Beach Run" tried to pass us. He was hampered by a badly slipping clutch, and the grapes and sandwiches we threw at him. Until we discovered that the grapes tasted alright so we saved them from further waste. During our battle we missed the others who had turned off toward Heywood, until we were informed by Jenny Double who had come in hot pursuit. A quick U turn found the others hidden just around the turn-off. Apparently some of the others had also gone straight on. Chris Athey then kindly lent me his Ruby, complete with slipping clutch, which made hill-climbing quite an art. A quick stop at the Border for photos, then on to Mt. Gambier, where Robert Humphreys furiously pulled down his engine and Chris went searching for some decent clutch springs, which incidentally were found and installed. Rob un-bent a valve, took out a ring, then prepared for the trip home. After a cleanup a group of us went into town to have a counter lunch and to savour the local death's head brew which was surprisingly good for foreign beer. Whilst some of us slept for the first time in 24 hours, the others went touring around visiting the Blue Lake and the Wild life sanctuary next to the 'Leg o' Mutton' lake. Later in the day a contingent of 5th. Aust. Austin beveners arrived and proceeded to make funny comments.


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# The Austin "Wasp"

NEW SOUTH WALES MOTORS LIMITED, of 93-97 William Street, Sydney, are responsible for the production of a series of very attractive sporting cars based on the famous Austin "Seven" chassis. These cars are known by the collective term "Wasp," but there are altogether four models, of which we publish an illustration of the most elaborate and expensive of the range—known as the "Wasp Special." It will be seen that the design of the bodywork of this

The "Number 2" model "Wasp" is fitted with the same body as that of "Number 1," but is minus the cowl over the front spring, while the equipment is not quite so complete. This vehicle as a 60 m.p.h. type costs £250, while with a speed of 65 m.p.h. it costs £260. The range is rounded out by a much simpler sporting type known as the "Number 3" model, which is priced at £235.

It should be observed that the

car follows the most up-to-date racing practice, with its forward-sloping radiator-shell, flared scuttle and beetle tail. Considerable use is also made of under-screening, so that the little vehicle is just about as well streamlined as it possibly could be compatible with comfort. Not quite so elaborate in design is the "Austin Wasp Number 1" model, which is fitted with a body of somewhat similar design, but possesses the normal Austin radiator. This little car, with a speed of 60 m.p.h., is priced at £275, while a slightly faster edition, capable of over 65 m.p.h., costs £10 more. The equipment includes six wheels, six balloon tyres, a "V" windscreen, two spotlights, two tyre covers, a folding hood which disappears into the tail when not in use, a cowl over the front springs, and a generous use of nickelplate.

coachwork used in the "Wasp" models is constructed entirely of steel, all joints being welded, the design being expressly intended to withstand the very great strains imposed upon the body of such a light car at very high road speeds. The seating position of the car is exceptionally low, and leg-room is provided for the tallest driver.

As a sporting mount for the motorist with not too much money to spend on a vehicle the Austin "Wasp" would be very difficult to improve upon, a fact that is proved by the very large numbers to be seen on Sydney's streets.

It only remains to add that the little vehicle, even in the short time it has been marketed, has to its credit quite a large list of competition successes.

Motor Life magazines ex VSCC Australia shared by Tim Shellshear.

A few issues later and the dreaded paid advertisement appeared.

Interesting the claim to be sole agents for the Wasp. Very similar to Melbourne adverts.




