


Extended Thanks to Kitchen Hands

Knitlok at Winchelsea

While reporting on his visit to the Winchelsea RSL 100 year celebration at the local footy oval in September, Robin Evans expressed some curiosity about the special bricks used to build the historic Winchelsea Grandstand. He had heard them mentioned but didn't know anything about them.

This rang a bell and I found a little about Walter Burley Griffin (the designer of Canberra) and a pioneer of modern design. He experimented with new building techniques and materials, including his patented 'Knitlock' concrete block wall system and 'Knitlock' roofing tiles, which featured offset joints and strengthening ribs at modular intervals.

Local builder, Herbert Warner, used Knitlock bricks to build the Winchelsea Memorial Grandstand in 1923. Other local buildings that used the system included "Kooringa" homestead and the Barrabool Church Sunday Hall. - Ed



Bay to Birdwood



Club members, Terry Fraser, Tim Christie and Ken Parry attended this year's Bay to Birdwood, and all gave very positive reports of the event.

Terry has provided a great report of his trip in the Hillman Gazelle (see below). Ken & Jenny drove across in their HD Premier Holden, with the only hiccup being a loose clip on a radiator hose. Ken said he was impressed with how the Holden performed, despite being a Ford man at heart.







This year's Bay to Birdwood was held on 19 October 2025. It featured over 1,500 entrants, making it one of the largest historical motoring celebrations of its type globally, including vehicles dating back to the early 1900s. Since 2020, the annual event has welcomed all historic vehicles 30 years and older.

The Bay to Birdwood starts in the Adelaide suburb of West Beach and concludes at the National Motor Museum in the Adelaide Hills town of Birdwood, about 70 km from the start.



The only Hillman in a show of over 1,500 cars



Having done the past two events on my Honda CB350 bike, I decided 2025 would be the year to take my 1967 Hillman Gazelle. The next decision was whether to trailer it over or drive. Both scenarios have their pros and cons, but the decision was made to drive, because an adventure is always a good thing - hopefully. The preparation started months beforehand, with all of the ignition system replaced. The water pump, fuel pump and generator all had rebuild kits fitted.



To be kind to vehicle and driver, the trip was broken with an overnight stop in Naracoorte. Next morning it was on to Adelaide via Keith and Tailem Bend. The morning of the event is an early start, arriving at the marshalling area at 6.30am. As with previous years, the marshalling was managed very professionally and efficiently. The route to Birdwood is lined with around 90,000 spectators holding their own champagne breakfasts and picnics.



Unfortunately, the route this year was plaqued with traffic congestion from start to finish. The warm day made this challenging on cooling systems, clutches and drivers. The organisers need to investigate what happened this year, so it can be fixed for next time.



Red Dust Revival

Vintage cars race in Lake Perkolilli Red Dust Revival

Nearly 200 vintage cars and motorcycles made the journey to Lake Perkolilli, on the outskirts of Kalgoorlie-Boulder, in WA's Goldfields, to race on the hard clay pan surface.

What is the Red Dust Revival?

The Lake Perkolilli Red Dust Revival is run by the Variety Club of WA Kalgoorlie Branch. The event celebrates the golden years of outback motor racing from 1914 to 1939. In 2025 about 130 pre-war cars and 40 motorcycles nominated. All proceeds from camping and spectator entry fees went to Variety, the children's charity, to help with their good works in the WA community.

Where is Perko?

Lake Perkolilli is a natural claypan about 45 minutes from Kalgoorlie in the Eastern Goldfields of Western Australia. The last part of the drive is on a dirt road and then a bush track. The track is OK for 2WD vehicles.

Lake Perkolilli has no permanent facilities. We ask that people leave the claypan to rest over winter so the track is in tip-top condition for the event. Everyone who organises the event does it for fun and we try to keep the event casual and in good spirit. We try our hardest to keep Perko this way. Perko is a volunteer run event.

"PPP, Plenary and James"

Our October guest speaker was club member James Park. With the mystifying title of "PPP, Plenary and James", the talk gave us an insight into just how some massive public infrastructure projects are funded, built and managed.

James started out by explaining a Public Private Partnership (PPP).

He said a PPP was a long-term agreement between the government and the private sector to finance, design, build, operate and maintain a piece of public infrastructure (like a road, railway line or hospital).

PPPs can expedite large-scale public infrastructure projects, which may otherwise be delayed or unaffordable. They deliver such projects more efficiently and often faster, by sharing risks and combining private sector expertise with public sector resources. They can improve value for money and ensure projects are completed on time and budget.


Government can have infrastructure built for no cost upfront. This upfront cost is paid by the private partner. This model transfers the risk from government to the private sector.

Once an asset is operational, government will pay the private partner performance- based payments to:

- 1. Pay for the operation of the asset; and
- 2. Pay off the debt used to finance the construction.

Agreements normally run for 20 to 30 years and then the asset is handed back to the public sector in a prescribed condition.

The Basic Structure



James explained that his background was in engineering and his first role was as an intern on the Western Roads Upgrade with Operations and Maintenance provider, *Ventia*. Over the next 4.5 years he worked in several roles, including pavement and structure engineering, traffic management and project performance. It was in the last of these roles that he got a true taste of what he described as "the PPP beast!"

In early 2023 he landed a job at *Plenary* as a project manager, working mainly in asset management. This involves working within the Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) of various operating projects. In 2025 he was appointed General Manager for the Plenary Environment (Barwon) SPV and has also worked on some international road bids, including regular trip to New Zealand.

Barwon Water Biosolids Management Project

When the EPA told Barwon Water to stop air-drying sewage at Melbourne Water's Western Treatment Plant, it prompted the authority to find a sustainable alternative solution. As a result the Blackrock site now accepts all of Barwon Water's "dewatered municipal sludge" (sewage) and treats it to the EPAs highest standard.



The resulting dried pellets are used by farmers as fertiliser.

This operations began in September 2012 and is a 20 year agreement, operated and managed by *Plenary*.



James used the Peninsula Link Freeway as an example of a current Victorian PPP. Peninsula Link is a 27 km four-lane motorway connecting East Link and Mount Martha in southeast Melbourne. It was the first PPP in Australia using the availability-payment model under the Partnerships Victoria framework. The project achieved its financial close in February 2010, it opened in January 2013 and is subject to a 25 year PPP agreement. In February 2010 the project had a net value of A\$849 million

James also spoke about the long term public art program which is a feature of the freeway. A collaboration with the local McClelland Gallery has resulted in striking public art pieces being installed along the roadway.


