#### **Cover Story – 1975 Chevrolet Corvette Stingray**

We first saw this car while on Tony Taranto's Tour in April 2015. It was in a Museum at Brimpaen which is in the Grampians. It took our eye straight away, and so, the process of purchasing it happened there and then

It was last registered in Freeling, SA in June 2007, but we don't have any information of its life between then and when we saw it. It was in excellent condition – all we needed to get it going was to take a new battery with us and some fuel. We contacted Club member Peter Fitzgerald who had a tilt tray and he brought it home for us.

When we bought it, it had very wide tyres on genuine Corvette rims, so

we bought new tyres and, of course, had all the motor etc checked before applying to put it on Permit.

The Chevrolet Corvette (C3) is the third generation of the Corvette sports car that was produced from 1967 until 1982. Our Corvette was built as a Targa-Top Coupe with a large 350 cubic inch Chev motor and a fibre glass body – this made it light weight and fast – a real American Muscle car.


#### Annual Geoff Herkes Memorial Pre '30's Tour (Trophy Points) - Sunday 19th November

Alfa Romeo Duetto Spider (1966-1990) By Giancenzo Madaro "The Cars that Made History" Series Donated by Ian Turner

#### Published in 1991

The thirty-sixth Geneva Motor Show had the honour of hosting the 1966 launch of a new Alfa Romeo Sports Car with characteristic boat-tail styling: the unmistakable 1600cc Spider, later officially baptised as the Duetto. After years of honourable service, the previous very successful Giulietta Spider was replaced with this new model. Both models were very successful in carrying on Alfa's long and glorious open sports car tradition.

Apart from the excellence of the new model's mechanical specifications which were derived from that of the earlier Giulia Spider, much of its success was from the individual styling developed by Pininfarina. This was achieved through a long series of prototypes from the 1956 Super Flow to the Giulietta Spider Speciale Aerodinamica of 1961.

The new car in 1966 was catapulted to world-wide attention by the film "The Graduate" starring Dustin Hoffman, where the new model Alfa Romeo starred throughout the film. The Duetto Spider styling proved so innovative,

and yet at the same time, so "classic" that the model lasted over twenty years. During

this time the Duetto Sider developed through four distinct series. The first series from 1966 to 1969; the second series from 1969 to 1982; the third series from 1982 to 1989, and, up until this book was produced, the fourth series from 1989 to 1991.

The author, Giancenzo Madaro, traces the complex and multivarious pattern of the Duetto's development, the frequent tail surgery and the grafting on of spoilers, right up until the current model when the book was written. With the help of numerous illustrations, the book describes all of the Alfa Romeo Spiders from 1966 to 1991, including all the American versions.

At the end of this excellent book produced in Italy, there are accurate technical files covering the 1600cc, 1300cc, 1750cc and 2000cc engine varieties of the Duetto. In addition, there is production data, chassis and engine numbers as well as previously unpublished material relating to all four series of the Duetto.





#### Melbourne, Victoria - Motoring a Century Ago in 1923 - Part 2 - from Steve Rattle

#### 4. Roads and Driving Conditions



In 1920 the Prince of Wales (later King Edward VIII) visited Australia, and on 19 October that year the road network connecting the Australian states was named in his honour. Its correct term is the Prince's Highway, but time and road signage has seen this abridged to the Princes (masculine) Highway, and even incorrectly referred to as the Princess (feminine) Highway.

Either way, early road conditions were appalling by modern standards and we should admire the early motorists who battled dust, mud, pot holes and puddles. It wasn't that long ago that the Hume Highway still meandered through many NSW towns en-route to Sydney, long before it achieved Freeway status.

Before bitumen was used for road surfaces, bluestone blocks gave horses grip for moving wagons. Wooden blocks were also used. Road width expanded as motor cars grew wider than their horse and buggy predecessors. Morris and some other manufacturers had problems on country roads following the wider ruts made by American vehicles. The Morris became a wider vehicle in Australia with the introduction of the Empire Oxford and Oxford models in 1927 and Cowley range in 1928.

#### 5. Petrol

Early cars had low compression engines – this enabled them to be hand cranked and even operate on low octane home kerosene once started using low octane petrol. In 1923 service stations were far and few between so running board gallon (8 pint or 4.54 litre) cans were a popular item on motor car running boards.

Lead was added to fuel to reduce engine knock and protect engine valves, but the environmental ramifications (remember Los Angeles air quality in the 1970's) were extreme. Most of us will remember the choice of 'Super or Standard' – Standard having a lower octane rating and used for older, lower compression vehicles.

In 2023, modern lead-free fuel has a 91 octane rating or higher – with much higher compression. Manufacturers no longer provide crank handles – imagine the Hospital Emergency departments full of motorists with broken wrists!

World petrol prices actually decreased over the period 1920 to 1929 as refinery processes improved and world distribution was no longer affected by wartime. In the USA prices fell from 30 cents per gallon in 1920 to 21 cents per gallon in 1929. But remember - a U.S. gallon is 3.7854 litres.



In Victoria, I have found reference to the following petrol values, with their 2023 equivalents detailed. An imperial gallon is equivalent to 4.54 litres.

Month / Year	Price in LSD	2023 \$ gallon equivalent	2023 \$ litre equivalent
September 1923	1 shilling / 8 pence per gallon	\$7.11 per gallon	\$1.57 per litre
June 1931	2 shillings /1 pence per gallon	\$10.14 per gallon	\$2.24 per litre
December 1950	3 shillings / 2 pence per gallon	\$8.64 per gallon	\$1.91 per litre

So pioneer Victorian motorists didn't really have cheap fuel by comparison to their earnings. Note the effect of the depression era for June 1931.

#### 6. Home Maintenance

In 1923 cars came with owner manuals detailing how and when oil changes, greasing, de-coking or decarbonizing, valve tappet adjustment and other maintenance service requirements were due. The motorist was encouraged and expected to undertake same, climbed into their overalls and grabbed the grease gun, giving each nipple a few pumps. The ability to adjust tappet clearances on a side valve motor was also a skill quickly mastered. Apart from oil changes, the 2023 motorist is excused from these dirty tasks. They are only encouraged to check liquid levels under the bonnet (anything with a yellow cap) and tyre pressure. The grease nipple has all but disappeared, valves no longer need manual adjustment, exhaust systems don't burn out as frequently and car servicing is a computer plug-in diagnostic process.

#### 7. Parking

I spoke to Mrs. Inez Duck in 1979 who told me she was a pioneer pre-marriage lady motorist in the early days of Melbourne. With her 1916 Chevrolet 490 she regularly drove and parked in Melbourne city – she said that even in 1923, parking was a problem particularly in:

Bourke Street – retail shopping and entertainment area

Collins Street - top end retail area for the wealthy at the eastern end, banking/finance at the western end

Spring Street - home of State & Federal Parliament, politicians and their cars everywhere, and

Spencer Street - Mail (postage) arrival / departure clearing and country rail travel drop off/collect.

She preferred to park in Lonsdale or Latrobe Streets and walk where she always managed to get an easy parking spot. The city limits didn't extend much further out than Sunshine in the west, Mordialloc in the south, Coburg in the North and Box Hill in the east back then.

Parking metres were introduced into the Melbourne CBD in 1956 - just before the commencement of the Olympic Games. The first parking metres in Australia were introduced in Hobart, Tasmania on 1 April 1955.

#### 8. Roadside / Breakdown Service

The RACV (Royal Automobile Club of Victoria) was formed in 1903 with 56 members – and a day trip run to Tooradin at Western Port Bay was their first outing. By 2010 they had grown to 2.1 million members.

In 1923, it was a long walk to the nearest telephone to call for assistance – motorists were expected to be able to change flat tyres, and running out of fuel was frowned upon as poor motorist judgement. Roads were still littered with nails coming loose from horses' shoes and punctures were common.

Early RACV breakdown serviceman, Keith Jenkinson, told me back in 1991 that the majority of call outs in the early days were ignition related – lack of spark. Wet magnetos or worn points in distributors kept cars from operating. Faulty vacuum tanks on American cars not providing fuel and also overheating – poorly maintained cooling systems.

Otherwise, the motor car of yesterday simply soldiered on – we changed flat tyres for ladies, but supervised those for men – chivalry existed and was expected. We would often be changing a flat tyre for a lady and notice a lazy husband or boyfriend hiding around the corner – these blighters were too frightened to get their hands dirty!

#### 9. Signalling

The Victorian motorist's right arm was certainly active in 1923 – six standard 'hand signals' were expected to be mastered before taking to the road. Motorists were on the lookout for other driver hand signals to judge their actions and plan their next move.

Early trucks had a metal arm and hand on the driver's door hinged to lift when turning or merging into traffic. As vehicles improved with hydraulic brakes, turn indicators and stop lights such 'hand signals' became obsolete. But they are an interesting reminder of times past.

#### 10. Sales

Motor car sales grew considerably in the 1920's and with only a handful of local manufacturers (such as Australian Six, Chic, Summit) our love of U.S. and U.K. vehicles prospered. Considering they were imported chassis with locally manufactured bodies, the car became a status symbol and a measure of wealth or success. Most important was the freedom of travel, leisure, ability to visit

friends and family at any time without the need to master public transport time tables.

The Australian Bureau of Statistics year book of Australia (2001) provides the following early vehicle numbers for Victoria & Australia. Their web site provides the 2022 numbers.

Within Australia we sell over 1 million new vehicles each year – an amazing statistic for a population of 26 million people.

#### 11. Registration and License

The unusual horse power (h.p.) rating system (bore in mm squared x number of cylinders /1613) was used to determine a cars registration fee in the state of Victoria. For a bullnose Morris Cowley, the formula would be 69.5  $\times$  69.5  $\times$  4 /1613 – 11.9783 rated horse power, therefore £2/2/0 annual registration fee.

The Victorian Motor Car Act of 1915 quoted the following annual registration fees:

Motor car not exceeding 6 ½ h.p.	£1/1/0	89.61
Motor car 6 ½ h.p. but not exceeding 12 h.p.	£2/2/0	179.23

Motor car 16 h.p. but not exceeding 26 h.p.	£4/4/0	358.45

Motor vehicles used exclusively 'for the conveyance or burden in course of trade' – in other words trucks, taxis and similar paid the £3/3/0 rate.

In Victoria, a driver's licence cost 2/6 (two shillings and sixpence) - the 2023 equivalent being \$10.67. A total of 43,701 licences were issued the preceding financial year despite there being 39,638 motor cars and motorcycles in Victoria.

In summary - I've enjoyed researching the Victorian motoring scene of a century past. The next century forward to 2123 will inevitably have its challenges, problems and obstacles – the demise of the petrol engine with increased government involvement seems inevitable. Electric and hydrogen vehicles are making their mark – and as the world changes, so too will our motoring habits and expectations.

#### Do You Know . . .

... the origin of Boxing Day? Yes, it refers to boxes, but not anything to do with unwrapping Christmas gifts.

There are competing theories for the origins of the term, none of which is definitive - no doubt because the exact origin has been lost over the centuries. But in my research, the common theme seems to be centred around the alms boxes in Christian churches, in both the UK and in Europe.

The tradition of giving money and other gifts to those in need, or in service positions, has been dated to the Middle Ages – it is thought to relate to the alms box placed in the narthex of Christian churches to collect donations for the poor through the year. These boxes were then opened on the day following Christmas, celebrating the Feast of Saint Stephen, and subsequently distributed to the needy.

This day originated as a holiday to allow servants to visit their families, since they were working on Christmas Day serving their masters. Saint Stephen's Day was considered the second day of Christmas. The Feast of Saint Stephen is referred to in the Christmas Carol, Good King Wenceslas, which tells the story of a Bohemian King in the 10th Century (modern-day Czechia) who goes on a journey, braving harsh winter weather to give alms to a poor peasant on the Feast of Saint Stephen – the Second Day of Christmas.

The British Monarch has continued this tradition of giving alms to the poor to the present day.
