
President Andy Burns presented Ian Watson with Club Life Membership

Cover Story – 1978 Holden HZ Premier

Purchased in 2016 in Renmark SA, the HZ Premier had been part of a deceased estate sitting around for approx. 10 years, registered and occasionally driven. The original owner bought the vehicle from Kincraig Motors in Naracoorte. It has a 253 V8, automatic transmission, power steering, 4/70 air conditioning (4 windows down,

70mph) and optioned with a vinyl roof (in perfect condition), and towbar. It had its owner's manual and service books in the glove box verifying the 179,000 kms showing on the clock.

The original owner had an Aunger rear louvre, Aunger mags and period lambswool seat covers fitted which came with the sale. The aftermarket radio/cassette has been replaced with an Air Chief radio/cassette, rear internal venetians fitted and more recently, white wall tyres replacing the old Goodyear NCT Eagles.

Mechanically, the car has had some heart surgery with valves being replaced, a new Stromberg carburetor, radiator, water pump, heater-tap and automatic transmission serviced.



Why a HZ Holden? My dream car would be a HZ GTS, however, the Premier is a substitute for this dream! In the 1990's I owned two HZ's - a 1977 Kingswood 308 and a 1979 Premier 253, and believe the last of a series have most of the bugs sorted. Together with the RTS (Radial Tuned Suspension), the HZ performs and handles very well with no understeer as in the previous models. It is a great cruiser both around town and on the freeway, a solid and safe car that keeps up with modern traffic and driving conditions. Recently on a trip up to my old stamping ground at the Minyip Show and Shine, the car didn't miss a beat. I appreciate the V8 rumble and the classic lines as these were the cars we grew up with in the 1970's.

Essentially, the car's exterior and interior remain original, rust free, maintaining its patina. Cosmetic items such as the front side protection strips are to be replaced. Whilst the paint is a bit thin on the boot, I intend to just keep it as it is, reflecting its 47-year-old life on the road.

Clubrooms Redevelopment Update #16

Last month I reported on the demolition of the clubrooms, and the preparation of the site to allow for the construction of the new structure. I also suggested a drive past the site to have a look at the work in progress.

Seeing is believing, so if you get the opportunity, I would encourage you to visit the site, pull up where safe to do so, and have a quiet walk around (outside the temporary fencing). You will have a good view from the front, but if you are able to, also have a walk down the south side (along the neighbour's fence line), and across the back, then return via the scout hall side. This will give a perspective of the size of the footprint we have to work with, and the chance to admire the completed retaining wall, as well as a flat and level site, with earthworks now all done in anticipation of the erection of the building. You may even notice the concrete driveway crossover and that the pine posts on the scout side have been cleaned up.

The site preparation presented some challenges. From the south side, the former car park was okay, but moving north toward the old site, we decided to extend the pad to incorporate the verandah section, but it got a bit soft as the tip was certainly discovered! There were lots and lots of old bottles, and heaps of steel rings off barrels dumped in there, so a deeper dive to hit some solid ground and then backfill and compact with fresher fill. This is now all cleaned up and levelled, with crushed concrete added and compacted for the shed base. The rear area beyond the retaining wall has also been spread and battered away to a clean and seamless surface. It's hard to remember what the car park looked like already!

As mentioned at the end of my last report, the Building Subcommittee met on site on Tuesday 29 April to discuss progress to date, costs to date and expected expenditure to come versus budget etc. together with next steps. We looked at options for the windows, and felt the prices were excessive, but Darren Miles subsequently sourced a favourable price from an alternate supplier, so these have been ordered and a deposit paid. Doors are also being determined, Darren is fine tuning options and getting the best price on these. The servery window is still to be worked out, initial pricing is not favourable at this point in time. Concrete was also discussed, with the decision to increase from 125mm to 150mm thick, and install double mesh to the library area. Pricing is being sought for this at the moment.

With the site prepared, the footings and erection were booked, and the screw piles ordered with a deposit paid. This is where the building permit is needed, and to process this, the building surveyor appointed has presented a list of requirements to be satisfied. This includes various minor

administrative details, information requests of materials used, signage, details of the road closure and consent from the land holder, together with the site feature survey showing boundaries and locations etc. There were also some compliance requirements around fire services coverage, pressure and flow testing etc. Not overly onerous, but time consuming to satisfy, so currently working on all of this, it will just mean the construction timeline will now be pushed out.

And finally for this month, as the project is progressing, soon we will be looking at the fit-out, so I will repeat last month's call for assistance. Do you have a trade and would like to be involved? If you are able to help out, please let a member of the subcommittee know.

PAST EVENTS

Florence Thomson Tour, Ballarat, 28th - 30th March 2025

Driving a <u>Beeston Humberette</u>, Florence Thomson travelled from Adelaide to Melbourne in March 1904 earning her the title of the first female to drive the trip.

In February 1905, Florence Thomson was the sole female entrant in the Dunlop Reliability Motor contest from Sydney to Melbourne. Mrs Thomson was one of the 16 entrants who successfully completed the five-day trial, driving a six horsepower Wolseley, over what was then nothing more than 562 miles of dirt track between the capital cities.

In 2017 to commemorate the event and pioneering spirit of women in motoring, the RACV along with AOMC created the annual Florence Thomson Tour with 2025 being in Ballarat. The rules of this tour are simple, lady drivers only so the men can safely tell the women where to go and get away with it, in most cases.

Friday night registration was at the Mercure Convention Centre where a meet and greet then a buffet dinner was held. There was a very broad selection of vehicles ranging from 1910 Renault AX to 1999 BMW including FN, Bugatti, Chevrolet, Ford, Austin, Alfa Romeo, Vauxhall, MG, Sunbeam, Jaguar, Holden, Daimler, Bentley, VW, Chrysler, Morris, Rover, Singer, Mercury, Wolseley, Triumph, Fiat, Bolwell, Jensen, Morgan, Porsche, Leyland, Mercedes Benz, Mazda. There were 47 British, 17 Australian, 14 USA, with the rest being European.

Saturday began at the Kingston Showgrounds with the 95 entrants photographed in front of the old grandstand before we had breakfast then at about 10am we were off. We travelled the long option which took us about 140kms via Glendonald, Clunes, Cotswold, Carisbrook, Baringhup, Maldon Newstead, Sandon, Yandoit, Franklinford, Shepherds Flat, & Hepburn to finish at the Daylesford Mill Markets where we had a boxed lunch. A wander around the market and then home in readiness for the evening dinner which was held at the Mercure. There was a dress up to the period of your car theme to the weekend. At the dinner there were many interesting outfits on display with a professional photographer attending. Many photographs of the event can be viewed at this website https://www.aomc.asn.au/galleries A great meal was served and the presentations were made with the evening winding down about 10.30pm.

Sunday saw us gather and leave the Mercure to travel to the closed Windmill Drive at Lake Wendouree where we parked then over to the tram museum for a catered breakfast, a look around the museum and tram rides before everyone headed off for home.

Lyn & I really enjoyed the weekend and a couple we met were camped beside us on our recent vintage caravan weekend in Heathcote.



The A-Series Engine - Its First 60 Years. (1951-2011)

In October 1951, the launch of Austin's new small car, the A30, changed the face of the English motor industry forever. Its engine coded AS3 at the time but soon named the A-Series became a cornerstone of the ever-developing British Motor Corporation (BMC) range and of many British Leyland cars that were to follow. It wasn't long before thousands of such engines were being built every week, and by the time the production lines fell silent in 2000 - at least 14 million had been made.



The A-series, brainchild of Austin's dynamic Chairman, Leonard Lord, was at the heart of what he planned for the increasingly complex BMC empire. Lord had arrived at Austin in 1938, determined to rebuild the company to his own standards. Not only did he want to increase sales, but rejuvenate the also to company's stodgy engineering

Even Lord, however, cannot have foreseen for how long and in how many ways, this engine would become pivotal to the future of the Corporation. As eventually more than 600,000 engines were being produced every year. Not only that, but the diminutive power unit popped up in vehicles as diverse as the Morris Minor; Mini; the BMC

> The production figures for all the cars fitted with various forms of the A-Series engines were Austin A30/A35 -577,871; Austin A40 Farina - 342,180; Austin Healey Sprite and MG Midget - 281,885; Mini or Mini Cooper -5,378,776; and Morris Minor/1100 cars - 1,267,954 vehicles. Of course, there were many other cars and tractors, also many other single seater racing cars and specials which did not sell in Australia.

Graham Robson, a long-time owner and enthusiast of cars powered by the A-Series engines has been involved in the English Motor Industry for all his working life – as an engineer; motorsport enthusiast; writer; road tester; technical analyst; and historian.


