


Sunday 23rd April – Monthly Club Run (Trophy Points) – Bertha Benz Run

By way of explanation, Bertha Benz was an investor in Carl Benz's enterprise and made significant contributions both financially and technically to the Benz Motorwagen. She famously "stole" the Motorwagen Mk3 before dawn in 1888 and drove it the 106 kilometres from Mannheim to Pforzheim (Black Forest) and back again several days later with the aid of her two sons. This was the first long distance trip in a vehicle, and demonstrated to the public that the motor vehicle was a practical means of transport.

14TH NATIONAL MODEL T RALLY HELD IN DUBBO 20T2

First of all, it looked like the Rally may be called off due to the flooding of Dubbo in the weeks leading up to the Rally, but we were assured by the organisers that it was full steam ahead and that the flood waters were receding.

So, we packed up and headed for Dubbo with the T on the trailer - we stayed in Albury, and then at Peak Hill just out of Dubbo. The roads in Victoria are a lot better than in NSW. Potholes everywhere and road surfaces just washed away.

Sunday 25th September: Booking/Checking in day for the Rally, usually not very eventful so a few of us took off for a drive around town. There was also a static display of the cars at the Showgrounds which we all attended.



Monday 26th September: Started with an 8am rolling start from the Information Centre car park in the middle of town, but if you are a conservative driver then you should leave at 7.30am. Today, we were heading out to the Narromine Aviation Museum via backroads that were quiet most of the time, but the potholes and flooded parts of roads were numerous. In some places, the water was 100 yards long and a foot deep, but the Museum was well worth it. Morning tea was served here as well. CWA, eat your heart out - if this is an example of things to come, we are in for a kilogram-stacking week. From here we went to Trangie for lunch at the RSL Club.

After lunch it was back to Dubbo via some detours due to flooding. 229 kms travelled for the day.

Tuesday 27th September: Today, we are heading to Wellington and the Caves, and Japanese Gardens. Now, the back roads to Wellington were the same as everywhere else - potholes and washed-out roads. A tour was organised for 9am, so it was a rushed trip from an 8am start. The caves were magnificent, but due to flooding some parts were inaccessible. The Gardens were amazing. Morning tea - again magnificent - was served here. We headed into Wellington and partook of some local fair for lunch. A leisurely drive back to Dubbo by some

other back roads was achieved. 199 kms travelled for the day.

Wednesday 28th September: Was a Dubbo experience day with a visit to historic Dundullimal Homestead just out of Dubbo. The Homestead is believed to be the oldest surviving sophisticated slab house in Australia. It has sand stone stables, timber church and sheds, and these illustrate the rural lifestyle on an isolated property. Built in the 1840's, as the head station on a 26,000-acre squatting run. Morning tea was served here whilst we had an opportunity to look over the homestead and its outbuildings. Then back into Dubbo for a static display and dress up day for judging. While we were parked up here at the Showgrounds, lunch was served. This was the only day it poured with rain, but luckily, we were under cover. The rain stopped in time to go back to our accommodation. 20.5 kms travelled today.

Thursday 29th September: Today is again a rolling start at 8am as we head to Collie for morning tea at the Collie Pub. Not much else at Collie other than the pub; drones took to the sky from many Rally participants to view the scenery. Awesome little outback pub though, none the less. From here, we headed to Gilgandra to the Rural Museum for a supplied lunch and a tour of the Museum. Fantastic display of everything imaginable to do with farming and rural living. Home again via backroads to Dubbo. 195kms travelled today.

Friday 30th **September:** Short drive on back roads again today, but west of Dubbo this time. Just a quiet cruise so as to end up back in Dubbo at a Park called Sandy Beach. Well - Muddy Beach for now. We were treated to morning tea and lunch here.

There was to be an interstate sporting event this afternoon. Nominations of two participants per state. Declan and Connor Bagot were enlisted as our reps. The game Frisby Golf. Well - what a hoot. The whole Bagot family (3 generations) were decked out in the same shirts for the day. Bright blue with yellow ducks. They really stood out amongst the crowd. There was a lot of cheering and yelling. Tasmania were declared the winners. None of the participants had ever played before. An early return to our accommodation was made to prepare ourselves for the final Dinner.

The next National Rally was announced for 2025 and the location is Ballarat. Raffles were drawn, trophies awarded to the winners and the Rally was brought to a close. 59 kms travelled today.

Saturday 1st October: With everything packed up, we headed off for the farewell breakfast at the showgrounds, said our goodbyes with a word to all meet again in 3 years' time in Ballarat.

725 kms travelled in the T Ford for the week and another 2,500 kms added to the modern car to get there and back home again.

Beneath the Bonnet

A History of Australian Automotive Parts Manufacturers Since 1896 By J. D. Beruldsen

For Federation of Automotive Products Manufacturers Canberra Published in 1989 258 Pages


When we talked of the Australian automotive industry in 1989 when this book was written, our thoughts often

turned first to the large, well-known car makers such as Ford or Holden and the others. Yet the car makers whose brands are household names, in general, make only about half of the motor cars. They rely on independent parts manufacturers to provide the components that make up the other half of the cars.

When this book was written these parts manufacturers were a wellestablished, integral section of the automotive industry in Australia. However, this was not always the case. Although local companies began making parts for the first horseless carriages in the 1890s, they had a long struggle to achieve their present-day prominence.

Herbert Thomson produced the Thomson steam cars in Melbourne from 1896. Small engineering firms, blacksmith shops, carriage makers, tyre manufacturers all contributed to the production and maintenance of the newly-arrived motor cars.

Then came the First World War, and, with it, the mass-produced car, in particular the Ford Model T. Local car makers could not compete, and imported cars dominated the Australian market.



For local parts makers this trend was a benefit, as most car importers did not bother to cater for spare parts. But it also had its drawbacks, as demand was spread over many makers and models. Part makers had to produce in ones and twos to a sample. This volume demand increased with the two World Wars and the Depression, with the shortage of shipping space.

During the First World War in 1917 the Commonwealth Government placed limits on the import of cars with bodies. This allowed an extensive body-building industry to begin. In 1920, when there were 75000 cars on Australian roads, the Victorian Automobile Chamber of Commerce formed the first association representation of parts manufacturers and car repairers as a section within its chamber.

Local parts manufacturers struggled between the two World Wars as the industry had to contend with competition from the Commonwealth Government who permitted the Ordinance Factory, Melbourne and the Small Arms factory in Lithgow, N.S.W. to produce a range of automotive parts when there were no orders for defence materials. But the outbreak of the Second World War changed things.

Because the automotive manufacturers had operational production lines and expertise in production control, the local industry was able to change from peace-time to war-time operations. It thus offered immediate and valuable support to the Australian Defence Forces of ships, aircraft, guns, gyroscopic mechanism and aircraft engines. It was also unusual that Australia could produce aircraft engines before the country made car engines, other than in ones and twos.

This vitality of the industry strengthened the resolve of the Curtin Government to produce an Australian car after October 1944. It is well-known that the Holden Car was the consequence of this, and by the early 1960s, with the help of the local parts Industry had attained a local content level of nearly 97% without seeking any special tariff protection or other assistance measures. The Ford Motor Company of Australia Ltd, Chrysler Dodge Desoto Distribution Ltd, and the International Harvester Company Pty Ltd all responded with increased local content in their existing range of vehicles – which included cars, trucks and tractors to the highest practicable level.

During the period of 1965 to 1984, there was a significant erosion of market access for parts makers because of the staggering increase in imported vehicles. From a 5% market share in 1965, the figure increased to 39% in 1984. Because this increase far exceeded market growth, the volume of locally manufactured cars fell from 334000 in 1965 to 320000 in 1986. Of course. Because of the Federal Governments of both political persuasions, we have ended up losing all of our Australian car production since this book was written. Very sad!

Another change that has occurred with this is the price of vehicle spare parts. With few imported vehicles and a high level of local content in cars during the latter 1960's, Australia held control for at least 90% of prices. That local influence has fallen very low today with no local price controls and poor parts supply from overseas.

At the back of the book there are 26 pages of 7 very extensive Appendices covering all the parts manufacturers and what they produced during the period 1896 until 1989. I wonder how many of these companies have survived in 2023? New car registrations in Australia in 1921 was 9300 vehicles, and in 1987 was 451800 vehicles.

This is an extremely important book to add to our large collection of books and magazines covering the long and successful history of our Australian car manufacturing up until relatively recent times.

Do You Know

.... who invented Blu Tack? Actually, its inventor is unknown! But a precursor product to Blu Tack was created by a sealant developer around 1970, as an accidental by-product of an attempt to develop a new sealant using chalk powder, rubber and oil. Although the experiment was a failure, workers started using the resulting goop to stick messages to each other's desks! And so, Blu Tack was born!

Blu Tack is described as a reusable putty-like pressure-sensitive adhesive, commonly used to attach lightweight objects (such as posters or sheets of paper) to walls, doors or other dry surfaces. Blu Tack has been made in Australia since 1971, but it was originally developed in Leicester, in England.

The exact recipe is a trade secret, but basically it is a combination of synthetic rubber compounds and mineral oil, along with mineral fillers and pigments, and is produced by Bostik. It is non-soluble, is not carcinogenic and can be swallowed without harm. The material is not flammable, but emits carbon dioxide and carbon monoxide when exposed to fire or high temperatures.

Originally, Blu Tack was white, but consumer research showed fears that children may mistake it for chewing gum, so a blue colouring was added. Originally, the name of the product was hyphenated.

Something of interest – in the UK in March 2008, 20,000 numbered packs of pink Blu Tack were made available, to help raise money for Breast Cancer Campaign, with 10 pence from each pack going to the charity. Since then, many coloured variations have been made, including red and white, yellow and a green. *Nerene Backhouse*


