Cover Story - My Triumph Dream - Les O'Hanlon

Following retirement from a senior position with the National Bank, I had the intention of travelling through outback Australia. I purchased a Triton flat-bed ute and fitted a Jayco slide on camper. This rig enabled us to travel to many places outside the normal tourist routes.

In 2010, whilst in North Queensland, I slipped down the camper steps breaking 3 ribs. After a painful trip back to Ballarat, I agreed with my wife that the camper had to go. So, I sold it and purchased a small Jayco Penguin Caravan. This rig remained small enough to still allow travel to the outback areas we loved visiting.



As our travels normally took place in the dry season, I found myself bored during the off season - so I set out to achieve an ambition from my youth in obtaining a Triumph Spitfire. I obtained a Spitfire in reasonable condition and set out restoring it.

In early 2016, I finally had it ready for registration and I joined the Triumph Car Club of Victoria and registered it under a club permit. My dreams had become reality and I looked forward to driving the Spitfire in our summer then heading north for the winter. This ideal existence didn't last for long, as in 2019 I was diagnosed with a rare form of Leukaemia that could only be controlled by 2 tablets costing \$90 each, taken daily. These tablets have a number of nasty side effects and after 3 years I found that, although with difficultly I could get into the Spitfire, getting out again was a major operation.

No longer able travel long distances and the problems accessing the Spitfire, I looked around for another model Triumph that I would be able enjoy. The Triumph Stag with its extra wide opening doors appeared to answer all the ticks. As I was no longer able to carry out repairs etc I set about looking for a Stag that had not been "restored" so that I could oversee that repairs etc were carried out correctly.

My son discovered a 1974 Stag being driven as a work car that the owner was willing to sell. We checked it over and found it mechanically in good condition only needing new plugs and other regularly replaced items. The body was a different matter with major rust in all panels. I purchased the Stag and had my mechanic carry out the mechanical repairs and change all the fluids, spark plugs, leads etc.

I then set out to find a panel shop willing to remove the rust. After being declined at most of the panel shops, I found that Innovation



Body Solutions in Sebastopol were willing to work on the rust. They cut and removed all the rusted sections of the panels and replaced these with new metal. After they had done this and repainted almost every panel, they delivered to me a Stag that could have come straight from the factory.

Due to my health problems, I found it difficult to travel to most of the Triumph Club outings. I met VCCC Secretary Nancy Jackson, and she suggested I join the club. I have enjoyed attending the monthly meetings and have found the members welcoming. I was lucky to be well enough to attend the Heritage Festival car display in Lydiard Street last year, where both the Spitfire and the Stag were present. I look forward to many future drives.












Brendan Stevens (left) dressed in Nepalese hat introduced our Guest Speaker, Graeme Kent (right).

Association of Motoring Club Meeting, 10th February, 2025

Special Meeting. The meeting commenced with a Special Meeting to amend the AOMC constitution to make provision for the inclusion of a special category of membership. Purpose is to make it possible for Clubs which elect to participate in the proposed shared insurance scheme to join a class of membership which includes a benefit of insurance coverage. For the likes of the VCCC (with a membership in the range 251-500), the cost of insurance would be \$480. However, it is not proposed to

cover property, and consequently, the VCCC would have to look elsewhere for this component.

Guest Speaker - Jon Bergman from Automotive Integration Systems spoke on his company's provision on vehicle security and tracking. This company provides bespoke solutions to protect a customer's vehicle from theft. The system has the ability to alert the owner to unauthorised movement, track the vehicle as to both location and speeds travelled at, and immobilise it. Whilst not cheap at an installation cost of \$1400, insurance companies will generally give a significant discount which generally more than offsets the cost of the system. Jon advises they hadn't lost a vehicle yet fitted with their system. We are talking about vehicles in the hundreds of thousands cost bracket.

Treasurer's Report – The AOMC holds funds of \$323,000 and has submitted a Nil Tax Return for the 2023-24 year.

President's Report - Keith Mortimer

City of Casey – The AOMC has been active in promoting the needs of heritage vehicle owners who have multiple unregistered vehicles stored on private land. The City of Casey has by-laws which restrict the numbers of unregistered vehicles able to be held on a property.

VicRoads - The AOMC/Vic Fed working party had a very positive meeting with VicRoads just prior to Christmas. Many of the issues that have been raised with the AOMC have been fed back to VicRoads. The feedback has been taken on board. The AOMC believes they have a way forward with communications and raising issues of concern for the benefit of all. VicRoads have affirmed the value of the peak bodies in assisting with day-to-day matters.

Australian Historic Motoring Federation – The AOMC, given that an election is looming, has been working in conjunction with AHMF to raise federal matters of interest, particularly luxury vehicle tax on imported heritage vehicles amongst other matters.

Income Tax Return – Just a reminder that Clubs (unless they are of a sporting nature and therefore can demonstrate exemption) need to have registered a contact person with the ATO. Either a "Return Not Necessary" form or a Tax Return needs to be submitted by the 31st March, 2025 for the 2023/24 tax year.

Insurance – The AOMC will take out a master policy which will cover public liability, officers, and volunteers. A Risk Management Framework is being developed which will assist Clubs who join the scheme to comply with the requirements. In the first year, commencing will be on a pro-rata basis, so that there is no overlap of insurance. The AOMC intends to run some seminars in April/May to assist those Club Members responsible for insurance to understand the requirements.

Florence Thomson Tour – Maureen Ross

Maureen reported that the event (28th - 29th March) was over-subscribed and had been capped at 100 vehicles. It is to be held in Ballarat and there will be an opportunity for local clubs to come and inspect the entrants' cars. Locations to be provided in the future.

CLUB RUN ETIQUETTE

Please apply the following etiquette associated with Club runs where we travel as a group:

Runs when travelling as a group, such as monthly Club runs, are run at a speed comfortable to the oldest/slowest car. As a leader can't see what is happening 10 or 12 cars back, it is your responsibility to adjust your speed to ensure that the car BEHIND you, is keeping up; don't worry about the bloke in front as he should be adjusting his speed to yours, and if we all do this it will flow up to the lead. Remember, we travel at the speed of the slowest vehicle.

Ideally, the older cars should be near the front of the group, for those in later cars, please consider this. There is no prize for being second car to the destination. Modern cars should travel at the rear of the convoy.

- When the group makes a turn, make sure that the member behind you has seen you turn. This may entail waiting at the corner, or just before it, until you see his blinker come on or him begin to slow and change direction. Again, the group ahead should slow down until you are back in their mirror.
- 3 **Don't Tailgate** Make sure that there is an adequate space between you and the car in front for modern traffic to overtake and get back in safely. The only exception to this should be when approaching an overtaking lane where you should try to close up the gap to the car in front so that modern vehicles who may want to overtake can get around a number of us in one move. Also, be aware of any modern vehicle following you and ease over to the left to allow them to pass safely.
- If you are leaving the run for any reason, let the leader know and also make your intentions clear to the person behind you so that the leader doesn't think that you are lost and the car behind doesn't follow you. (I can recall a number of years ago a member realised he had left some medication at home and decided to call in and get it during a Begonia Rally, only to find about 30 cars following him around the residential streets to his home).
- 5 **Breakdowns** If a member's vehicle breaks down on a run, the car behind should pull over with them and the rest should continue unless you have sufficient mechanical knowledge or tools that you are able to be of assistance. Those that stop should ensure that they are well off the road and not creating a hazard to other motorists. Please ensure that someone has the leader's mobile phone number so that you can let them know what is happening, and you may also need directions once you have got things sorted out.
- 6 On most occasions, you are free to travel home at your own speed. This is the time to blow the cobwebs out of the exhaust if you so desire, but don't do anything dumb that could reflect on the Club.

If we all adhere to these simple guidelines, everyone will have an enjoyable outing without causing stress to other road users.

Clubrooms Redevelopment - Update #13

Another exciting update – as we move forward with this project, I hope this is keeping you up to date.

From the statutory planning perspective, shortly after preparing the report for the newsletter last month – the Planning Permit arrived. As reported last month, we had the indication this would happen, subject to no appeals being lodged with VCAT. The 28-day timeline passed and this proceeded to the issuing of the permit.

It is basically the same document – just a different heading – as the Notice of Decision to Grant a Permit and has carried through all the previously advised conditions that apply before the development starts. These were all in last month's newsletter, so I won't repeat again. A key item is for amended plans to be submitted to Council so that we can get the 'stamped plans' to proceed. These are being lodged as I write this article.

The Building Subcommittee have had a meeting on site, to look at the location of the new building and levels, to determine the expected amount of fill that will be needed for floor level etc. The plans that we have are not clear, and so we feel best to have a revised site survey done. The building supplier has also asked for clarity on the placement - within title boundary etc. and we would also like to be able to check against the lease boundary— so this is all heading in the same direction.

The survey has therefore been ordered – to accurately position the new building, floor heights etc. This will also include placement of a retaining wall to the south side, to run parallel to the bluestone open drain, which will then batter to the drain. This will need to be engineered and probably a permit as well. The survey will also be handy for rerouting of the shared path that is a permit condition.

As to current building works, there is a mix of the old and the new. On the existing (old) clubrooms, all the asbestos has been removed and properly accounted for – thanks to Andy, and the Clearance Certificate has been issued. This was mainly in the toilets, so they are all stripped out. The floor boards have been removed in many spots – recycled by club members. The Air conditioner units have been removed from the roof.

The windows will be the next large batch, the protective screens have been removed, the curtains and trims gone, and will stay in situ a bit longer to keep the structure lockable until demolition. The three trees on the verandah side have been cut down, with the stumps still visible, and will be pulled out during the demolition process.

On the 'new' side, this month I could say that we have had the turning of the first sod – not in a ceremonial sense – but in a practical (and mechanical) way. If you have been past the clubrooms in the last month, you will notice that works have started, so things are happening! One of the first steps is to disconnect/transfer the electricity. On Saturday 1st February, thanks to a team effort of club members, a hole was drilled and the builders pole installed, to allow the transfer of the power. The gas line has also been removed and the meter gone. You will also now see temporary fencing around the site (and it looks like the public are now using the footpath on the south side – as it is intended to be!). The portable toilet has also been installed and water established.

The demolition permit is being worked on, and although linked with the planning permit and the stamped plans, Andy is working on having it separated out to keep things moving.

And lastly for this update, running alongside this is the ongoing work on the lease. I have followed up Council and had a phone hook up for an update. This also somewhat fits with the site survey (that we have ordered).

DEECA are conducting their own formal survey as it is Crown Land. Normally no works can commence until this is done, but at a local level they are supportive. Their survey has been paid for (not by us though!) but hasn't been received back to Council yet. The lease will be put forward for approval - with the Crown Allotment details and will be amended for the extra bit of land we are stretching in to. I am expecting a draft in the coming weeks, so that we can review and be in a position to finalise and sign once the reservation is complete.

I also confirmed our previous discussions regarding the length of the lease, and as I have probably said before, we are looking for as long as possible, given the investment we are making in this project. As we are self-funding the project, we are able to have maximum 21 years (by approval), and I have discussed a special condition for a further 21 years on expiration of the first term.

The Hupmobile Motor Car in Australia (1908/1941)

By Duncan C Hudson

"The Car of the Australian Family"





Without a doubt some of the best books in our Club Library are like this one that have been self-published by Australian Car Club Members who spend their lives using and writing about a particular marque of car in Australia.

Robert and Louis Hupp were the founders of the Hupp Motor Car Company in Detroit in 1908 with a 4-cylinder 2.8 litre, light runabout, with two bucket seats and a bolster fuel tank. It was joined by a Touring Car in 1911, both models selling very well. Robert Hupp had previously worked for Oldsmobile and Ford, so with some financial support they were able to build a small factory in Detroit, where in 1909 the first model 20 Hupmobile was built and exhibited in the Detroit Automobile Show. Some of these cars did reach Australia, where examples still exist today. A total of approximately 561464 Hupmobiles were produced between 1909 and 1940. In fact, most models right up until the 1940 Skylark model reached Australia. Duncan has reproduced all the registration figures of all the Hupmobile cars sold in Australia from 1909 until 1940.

The body styles differed slightly from the USA models with the Australian versions having bodies built by T.J. Richards and Holden in Adelaide. Holden built 41 Sedan bodies in 1929 and 35 in 1930. 127 Sedan bodies were built in 1931-33 by Phizackerleys of Sydney. In 1909 Phizackerleys became the first overseas agent for the Hupmobile in the world, receiving a shipment of 23 Hupmobiles, the largest shipment ever brought to Sydney at that time.





This excellent local book has many chapters covering the details of all the different model Hupmobiles up until 1940 with many period and current photographs of Australian cars in black and white or colour.

In 1911, Robert Hupp left the Hupp Motor Car Company and established the Hupp Corporation. Out of this break-away company appeared a new car – the R.C.H. being Robert Hupp's initials. The first model, known as the Model F or 25 went on sale in USA in September 1911. The Model F bore some similarity to the Hupp Model 20 car. In January 1912, another model appeared known as the SS, and this car looked like the Model 32 Hupp. The Publication – S.A Motor

officially reported that 14 R.C.H. cars were registered in South Australia in September 1914. But the R.C.H. cars were not a success and by October 1912, R.C.H. were in the hands of the creditors. Production did not continue after 1915. There are period and current photographs of Australian R.C.H. cars in Australia in this book.

There are many photographs of various Australian Hupmobile cars being restored in recent years, as well as a number of fully imported models with American bodies. There are also group photographs of current Australian cars at various Hupmobile Club events. One club car featured is a 1935 Model D Sedan with a Haynes U.S.A. body that has currently travelled 68,000 miles. Its original owner was Horace Osborne of Ballarat. After two other owners, it is now owned by Don Jacobs.

Sales of Hupmobile car during 1936 were very poor, so the factory was closed

down. It reopened in 1937/38, building a new model using the discontinued 810/812 Cord bodies using Hupmobile conventional running gear, but few of these 6-cylinder Skylark Model were sold. The Graham Car Company also used the same bodies, but these also did not sell well. 1941 was Hupmobiles' last year. Very few of these last Skylark models were sold in Australia, but in this book, the Author Duncan Hudson states that a gentleman who ran a Hupp agency in Ballarat in the 1930's, sold a new Skylark Sedan, but the Company never invoiced him for it, so his profit was very good! Who was the Agent for Hupmobile Cars in Ballarat in the 1930's?

<u>Postscript</u>: We have 11 feature articles of different Model Hupmobile cars and 6 technical articles related to Hupmobiles in our Club Library currently!

Recently Nerene emailed the December 2024 copy of "Reflection", the Newsletter of the Wagga Wagga Club to club members. Colleen and Gerald Rainbird had written a report of the 21st Hupmobile Tour, held in Bendigo during October 2024 with details of the event with many colour photographs of the Hupmobile cars from 1910 Model 20 cars to 1934 Models. There were 21 Hupmobile cars involved, with owners from New Zealand, WA, QLD, SA, NSW, and Victoria. *Ron Gay*

Two of our Club Members have contributed their stories of the Hupmobiles that they own -

1913 Hupmobile Model 32 – Brett & Kirstin Holloway

We have for a long time considered a Veteran vehicle, but have been deterred by the smaller size and lower travel speeds. This however is a large Tourer for its era and is a comparatively fast car. Following on from the Model



'20', the first large car by Hupmobile was the Model '32', which extended from an 86-inch wheelbase to a 106-inch wheelbase in 1912.

This vehicle is a 4 cylinder, 32HP, 5 passenger Tourer, with magneto, crank start, gravity fed fuel, 3 speed manual plus reverse, and with 24" wheels and tyres.

This is also an all steel body - in 1911 Hupp became one of two pioneering the use of all steel, the first of the Budd bodies – before Budd Manufacturing was formed.

This car was restored in the 1960s, early photos show it being used in 1970. It has been verified by the Dating Committee of the Veteran



Distinctive headlights with the high mounting, and a radiator shape that became a trademark sight for Hupp makes this a real work of art.

If you haven't driven a Vintage Car, let alone a Veteran Car, you don't know what you are missing!



We purchased her from Fingal Head, NSW (Coolangatta) – she was advertised in Restored Cars – and delivered to Melbourne by TNT on 23rd June 1995. We had the motor

rebuilt in Melbourne.

Some of the many trips we travelled in the Hupmobile – We organised a trip over to the Bay to Birdwood in 1996 which was a 14 day trip with 12 cars from the Club, and other members joined us in Robe, travelling around the coast to Adelaide. My cousin, Janice and her husband, came over from New Zealand to see us and to see the Bay to Birdwood run. There were over 1775 entrants. They liked the old cars; they had a Zephyr 6 at their home in New Zealand. Janice and Evan travelled with us to Birdwood. The weather was not kind with rain when we set off, and the car park at Birdwood was under

water. It was not long before an announcement was made for everyone to leave as the river was rising, and we may get bogged or marooned. We made our way back another way as more cars were still arriving.

We finished the trip via Mildura and Swan Hill. Dorrie Callow would always comment on the wonderful trip

We also organised a 14-day trip with Alan Giltrap to Canberra – 9 cars. Alan had just finished restoring his Star.

We have had many runs with the Hupmobile – the Autumn Festival at Bright; Geelong Car Rallies; Swan Hill and many more – and our own Club runs each month.


