

A Mystery Object









Forget the Beast of Turin! This brutal Christie front wheel drive racer is much more EXTREME! It is possibly the most exciting and elusive racing car ever. It not only is front wheel drive, but also has a huge and extraordinary transverse V-4 engine of almost 20 litres! It is as if it comes from another world, with its four large pots, riveted crankcase and big and short exhaust pipes, almost blowing their flames in the face of the driver. Late in 1903 John Walter Christie, an American mechanic, engineer and inventor, started designing extraordinary vehicles with the most unusual engines and transmissions. His point of view wasn't as common as others. He aimed at designing a concept that pulled (like a train or carriage), instead of pushing (like a boat). That is how he came to front wheel drive. But he went a step further placing the engine transversely between the front wheels, just like Alec Issigonis did some 50 years later when he designed the Mini. Christie was the first serious proponent of front wheel drive cars in the US. It had an engine that housed an astonishing 20 litres (1,214 cubic inches), mounted transversely, the crankshaft taking the place of the front axle! It was a completely new design, specially built for the 1907 racing season and using no parts from previous racers. The immense engine had a bore and stroke of 184 x 184 mm (7 1/4 inch square) and 8 atmospheric inlet valves per cylinder and just one mechanically opened overhead exhaust valve. The transverse mounted engine employed crankshaft mounted spur gears and telescopic U-joints on each end to drive the front wheels, originally through a transmission arrangement that featured dangerously exposed gears. Later this was changed, to make it better suited for high-speed racing.

Rig's Tips

When it comes to wanting an old vehicle in your life, you have two options:


- i) go out and purchase a restored car/bike and you are away, or
- ii) buy a project which requires some work. This can be the cheapest option in some cases but depends on how much work is involved and how handy you are. It's also an advantage to have friends who are handy or in the trade. At least older vehicles have simple electrics so requiring a degree in electronics is not a requirement! These days there are many tools available to make the job easier. Over the last 50 years, I have used various products to remove paint off panels but recently I was made aware of an easier way than using paint stripper. There are pads available to fit a 5" angle grinder, called a "Multi-purpose strip disc". These work on most surfaces without causing damage, however sharp objects like nails, rivets, bolts, etc. will soon rip them apart so remove these first. Very quick & efficient, and with a wipe with a cloth, undercoat may be applied. These are available at Bunnings, Mallee Bearings & probably other outlets.

Remember, when using any workshop power tools wear appropriate protective equipment. As a sign I once saw said "It's hard to get used to goggles but harder to get used to a glass eye."

<u>Presidents report:</u> Sadly, we won't be in our upgraded clubrooms for our AGM. With only 2 weeks to go, the following works are to be completed: internal and external painting, lights and power points to be fitted, plumbing fittings in the toilets, air conditioning outlets to be reinstated, floor coverings in the library and toilets, steps and ramp, and the new front door. Following our discussions with Council and the builders, it was found that the hose reel was not required and could be removed, along with all that part of the wall. That section was found to contain asbestos, so with that added cost plus the front door, the club will be paying about \$5,000. When one considers that council have spent \$200,000, our contribution is rather small and certainly well worth it. As previously stated, the AGM will be held at the Midway centre, but we have been given the use of the larger room due to the expected numbers attending. (The smaller room caters for 80, and we filled it at the July meeting.)

I wish to thank the members that turned up for the President's run on Sunday 21st. It's always hard to estimate numbers for catering, and after indicating to the new look Reddy Pub to expect 30, we had 27 sit down for lunch. I, like most of the attendees, was astounded at the scale of the operation of Global Roto-Moulding. It was certainly amazing to think that 900 products are turned out of this locally based factory. It was nice of Howard Ferry to give his time on Sunday, and at reasonably short notice, to explain the operation.

Don't forget, the running of our club depends on members contributing some time and effort, so if you are prepared to do this, put your hand up. Satisfaction is the reward!
