

Peter continues to leave his mark after 40 generous years

After being 'conned into it', the 88-year-old Justice of the Peace is showing no signs of slowing down

COULD you imagine being woken up by police officers banging on your door at 2am for you to sign a search warrant?

What about jailing a customer of yours who was in trouble with the police?

who was in trouble with the police?
Well, that's exactly what Ballarat's Peter
Rogers has had to do in his 40 years as a
Justice of the Peace (JP).

"I still sign 'Peter W Rogers' as I have done every year," he said. It's a job that requires patience, fun, care

It's a job that requires patience, fun, care and a good hand for signing documents. For four decades, Mr Rogers has done just that, volunteering his own time to help the community and police.

He has used his signature to verify

He has used his signature to verify thousands of legal documents as a IP for the public at the Ballarat Police Stationanything from divorce papers to statutory declarations and affidavits, to certifying copies of documents.

"It's a community service, plus it's an interest. I'm nearly 89, so it gives me something to do," Mr Rogers said, reflecting on his time

"I got conned into it 40 years ago. I had to go up to the police station, and they swore me in up there."

He said a lot has changed over the years, including the type of work a JP does.

"When I first was a JP for the first number of years, we used to do the bails and remands and all of that," Mr Rogers said.

"Then they brought in a system with the bail justices. At that time, my wife was pretty sick and I did half of the training, and I never ever finished it, so I never became a bail justice. You'd have to go (to the police station), and there would be the person who was being charged. You had to listen to the police story and listen to his story and make up your mind whether you're going to put him in jail or bail him."

Mr Rogers worked at Peter Amor Motors as a service manager when he first became

a JP in 1985 - this proved to be an interesting combination. "I had to lock up one of my customers one night. He never came back to the workshop," he laughed.

Mr Rogers said signing off search warrants was also a regular duty, even at ridiculous hours. "You'd often have police pull up at 2am or 3am, bang on the door and tell you what happened," he said.

"With these search warrants, the justices were the safety net between the police and 'I want to search (someone's) house'. Ninety-nine per cent of the ones that I ever signed were because of drugs.

"They'd call you down (to the police station) if you're doing a remand, but search warrants, quite often they'd come to the house."

Signing off on search warrants and bailing or jailing offenders is no longer a part of the role of a justice of the Peace, among a number of big changes over the years.

number of big changes over the years.
"When I became a JP, they gave me a book about that thick, about that square," Mr
Rogers said as he used his hands to demonstrate just how big the book was. Now ... we have fairly regular training sessions."

have fairly regular training sessions."
He said a typical day for a JP at the Ballarat Police Station involved getting in early, before doing up to 150 signatures in a shift, which usually lasts for a couple of hours, before another comes in.

"We do about a thousand signatures a week between the lot of us, that's 4000 a month," Mr Rogers said.

"We're here for about 35 hours a week, so that's equivalent to one person for the police. They don't have to do it ... they can be doing real work."

He said JPs assist a range of people with different needs.

"The divorce ones are the funny ones. You'll get three scenarios. You'll get them come in, one at a time - they're easy. You get them both in together and they'll be laughing...or you'll get both come in together and they'll be like a cat and dog fighting."
