Club Member Receives OAM

The recent King's Birthday Honours List included Past President and Committee man. Roger Sykes. The Geelong Advertiser printed the following report on Roger's award.



Roger Sykes OAM

Moolap's Roger Sykes was just 17 when he joined the Geelong West Brigade of the Country Fire Authority (CFA) in 1958. Mr Sykes said he joined up largely for the "sporting aspect" being a keen runner. More than six decades later at the age of 84, he still involved as a volunteer and has now been recognised for his community service with an Order of Australia medal.

Mr Sykes said the most fulfilling part of a lifetime spent in the CFA was "feeling as though you're contributing" and the support of the firefighting community. Throughout his time at the CFA he has worked to raise funds, sat on committees, and being chair of both the Geelong West and Belmont Brigades, the latter of which he transferred to in 1989. In 2008 Mr Sykes became a life member of the CFA, and 10 years later was awarded his 60 year medal.

Volunteering as a firefighter wasn't the only way Mr Sykes gave back to his community. Between 1991 and 1993, he was mayor of the city of South Barwon prior to the amalgamation, capping a decade-long stint on the council.

Born in Belmont, Mr Sykes attended school in North Geelong. Outside of his community involvement, Mr Sykes worked in the trucking industry. Sykes Transport traces its origins back to 1959 and the company is run to this day by Mr Sykes's son in Western Australia. By 1973 the company had 10 vehicles and, according to the company's website, in 1981 became the first operator to obtain the "necessary permits" to operate road trains across the Nullarbor.

Vehicles have been a passion for Mr Sykes; since 1998 he has been a member of the Western District Historic Vehicle Club, serving on the committee from 2003 to 2015 and as president from 2011 to 2013.

The aim is to print a hardcopy book, with the possibility of creating an electronic record as a by-product. (These electronic files could end up in the library and/or on our club website as scanned images and individual collections about separate subjects.)

We are telling you about this now for a few reasons. While April 2027 might seem a long way off, it isn't long when undertaking a big project like a club history. We need to start now so that we can collect and record all the raw material that will contribute to the book.

We have a wonderful record in the Backfire, which has been produced since the club began. This will provide the basic time line of what happened, when and who was involved. We need your input to fill out these bare bones: to add the color, the personal stories and the detail.

Here's how you can be involved at this stage.

Firstly, start looking through your club

memorabilia. Photographs, slides and artefacts will contribute enormously to the publication, so have a rummage around. Think about the club events you have taken part in over the years and the items you might have that would illustrate this in a book about the club. Two & three day rallies; swaps; Oily Faces; dinners; working bees; overseas trips; the various places in which the club has met over the years; the Backfire and how it was produced - just to give you a few ideas to start thinking about.

What about the memorable people who have taken part? And of course the vehicles - the restorations, the trips, the breakdowns and the repairs.

Secondly, you may want to contribute as a member of the subcommittee overseeing the project. Contact John Bailey if you do.

I will be the collection point for your images and memorabilia, so give me a call to arrange for me to borrow it, scan/copy it and get the details.

Soup Day line up

I'm told there was an excellent turn up of around 40 people for the annual soup day line up at the clubrooms on 19 June.

While Adrian has supplied these photos of the event, no one wrote up a report, so I can't give you any details.

However I can recount a coincidence that related to one of the items brought along to talk about on the day.



Among Adrian's photos was one of an old house. I gather this print had been brought along by Ray and Judith Matthews. I recognised it

immediately because I had scanned the self-same image during my stint at the Geelong Heritage Centre just the Friday before. It is of a print of Highton House, built by John Highett in around 1840. Highett was an early Geelong landowner who came here from Van Dieman's Land in 1837. He also took up Mt Hesse Station in partnership with his cousin, William Harding.

Highton House was built on a commanding site above the Barwon River. Highett was a successful farmer and flour-miller and well known as a horseman and breeder. He died at Queenscliff on 16 January 1867, survived by his wife Sarah, five sons and one daughter.

As explained in the detail from the Highton Rotary Club website (below) the original painting was done by Bob Tantau, a Rotary Club member. Bob's son John is a current member of the WDHVC.

Highton House.

The picture is a print of a water colour painting of Highton House by a past club Highton Rotary Club member, Robert W Tantau. (The Club used to give a copy in a presentation folder, to guest speakers at dinner meetings as thanks for their visit. - Ed) Highton House was a stately eight room mansion, built for John Highett (1808-1867). The two-storey building, sited on a 50 acre farm, with an orchard and vineyard, was approached by a long, tree-lined driveway from Barrabool Road. The mansion had a wide verandah on all four sides and cellars beneath the verandah contained a bar, a butcher's shop and dairy. The sandstone walls were two feet thick. Highett bought much of the surrounding land after coming from Tasmania in 1847 and the area became known as "Highett Town", which was later shortened to "Highton". He tried to sell Highett House and his land in 1854, but could only lease it in 1858 to Edwin Hooper, who made it into the "Montpellier Hotel, Picnic Gardens and Pleasure Grounds". The hotel, with commanding views of Corio Bay and Geelong Town, became a popular family picnic resort, patrons walking from Geelong to the Barwon River to be transported free of cost across the river by punt. It was then a short walk up the hill to the hotel. (It may have been short - 600m -, but it was very steep. I believe a horse and wagon was used to get to the top. – Ed) Highett resumed residence in 1865 and the house remained in the family until about 1886 after which it had several different owners until 1932, when it was damaged in a storm. It was demolished shortly afterwards. The ruins and park were purchased by the Geelong City Council in 1960. The foundations were partly restored by the Barwon Jaycees in 1974 and are now incorporated into Montpellier Park.


Coffee Run to Lethbridge Railway Station - 5 June

Club member Allan Tipper is also the president of the committee for the Lethbridge Railway Station building and he suggested that it might be an interesting venue for a coffee run. Our Coffee Co-ordinator thought that sounded pretty good and the result was that about 20 cars enjoyed a nice run out there on 5 June.

Allan and other committee members were there to greet us and the building was open for us to inspect. The sun was shining and the two-storey bluestone station looked most attractive.













Club members had the run of the place and were able to wander through the various rooms of the station and the adjoining station master's home. Locals were on hand to

answer questions and tell us about the building as we walked about.

Meanwhile our Coffee Co-ordinator and a few helpers set about preparing the hot drinks and eats in the kitchen. The morning tea was delicious and the \$10 a head raised was donated to the station committee to further its restoration and furnishing projects. A long table in the station waiting room

The station had been abandoned and run down, before Vic Track restored it. The VicTrack website explains: "We are restoring historic station buildings through the Community Use of Vacant Rail Buildings Program. The program involves restoring disused station buildings in regional towns, some of which have been vacant for decades, so they can be used by local community groups.

Often rural communities don't have nearby spaces for people to get together or for local groups to use, so the program has the double benefit of bringing the station buildings back to life while providing the community with new spaces for them to enjoy. The restored buildings also provide a boost to the regional economy, by attracting tourists and visitors to rural towns."

So far over 20 buildings have been restored under the program. The Lethbridge project was only opened in April this year, and we could still smell the fresh paint.

Coffee Run to Lethbridge Railway Station - 5 June

Lethbridge Bluestone Train Station Inc. subleases the building from Golden Plains Shire Council and will manage it as a multi-purpose community arts and cultural hub.

The restoration work included structural repairs and refurbishment, a new a kitchenette and an accessible toilet so the building can be used for community events and meetings. An expert heritage architect, worked with the contractors, Rendine Constructions, to ensure the restoration respected the building's history.

History of the Lethbridge Bluestone Train Station



Lethbridge station circa 1890. The place was unchanged from opening day, preserving its neat and tidy appearance. It had an extra operational role in managing train movement to the nearby quarry siding when it was in its prime. - Library Victoria image.

The Lethbridge Railway Station on the Geelong - Ballarat line was erected in 1862 by contractors John Campbell and Co from designs prepared by Victorian Railway architects. This regular coursed, squared basalt structure in the Victorian Italianate style consists of a part two-storey station office, residence, lamp room, and with a timber veranda over the platform.

The Lethbridge Station is one of a notable group of stylistic similar railway stations erected in 1862 on the Geelong-Ballarat line. This structure is an excellent example of country railway station architecture of the 1860's in Victoria, designed by innovative Railways Department architects, at the time of great railway building activity in the state. The Geelong-Ballarat line, which opened on 10 April 1862, includes important viaduct structures at Moorabool and Batesford.

The Lethbridge Railway Station was extended by construction of a weatherboard kitchen and wash house prior to 1923. Minor internal alterations have also been carried out.

The passenger train stopped operation in late 1978. The operation of the station shut down on June 30 1990. Residency at the station stopped shortly after. Goods trains and steam trains still pass through the station.



From The Geelong to Ballarat Railway - A Stations History
by Norm Houghton

2.4 Lethbridge 99.3 km; 168 metres

Lethbridge township was formed in 1854 as a way point on the road to the Ballarat goldfields and as a pastoral and agricultural centre. It was a small place at first but boomed when the Geelong to Ballarat railway was being built through the area and reaching a population of more than 1,000 persons. Much of the boom was attributed to railway construction workers at the Lethbridge quarry. On railway completion the place settled to a more sedate existence with a population of 300. The town had all the usual amenities such as three general stores, bakery, blacksmith, hotel, three churches, mechanics institute and library, school and post office.

The railway station at Lethbridge opened with the line. It consisted of a bluestone station building with office and residence, Up and Down platforms of 92 metres, goods siding with shed and livestock loader. A little later an additional dead end goods siding was placed on the Down side of the station at the Geelong end to cater for the grain and firewood trade. The place was a loco watering station from line opening, this facility being a large reservoir on Bruce Creek with a pipeline to a tank and crane at the station.



Passenger traffic was one of the better performers along the line. Averages for outwards journeys to the mid-1920s were in the order of 5,800 annually before a dip through the Depression. There was Revival from the late 1930s and particularly in the post war period to something like 6,400 annual averages. A terminal decline set in from 1961 steadily diminishing from a few thousand down to a few hundred by the time the rail passenger service ended.

Outwards loadings were not heavy. They composed wool, hay, grains, rabbit carcases and fruit. Wool was not a big loader, being about 100 bales or so each season. Firewood was not as extensive as other stations and ran in bursts of a couple of thousand tonne annually when it did.

Inwards traffic was a lowly few hundred tonne each year until collapsing to virtually nothing after 1950. When the double line was singled in 1934 Lethbridge retained its local facilities and was made a crossing station.

The station was closed to all goods traffic on 10 April 1967. Passenger services continued until the termination of the rail in 1978 and switched to road coach. The place continued as a crossing station until 30 June 1990. That was the end of Lethbridge.

A Crossley Collection

I had a call from Harold Newton recently, asking if the club had any "official" storage space available. (A great question. Many members would love access to more shed space. I am certain that, however large such a space might be, there would be material to fill it!) I said that I knew individuals made their own arrangements to gain access to an extra shed or two, but that there was nothing official arranged by the club.

I gathered from the call that Harold had learned of a huge hoard of parts for his beloved Crossleys, involving up to six bodies and a mountain of bits. As a follow up Harold has sent in this letter and photos. It must have been a real treasure trove and illustrates an observable trend, as older owners die or dispose of their collections!

Hi Jon,

Here starts the lesson.

That out-of-the-blue phone call from fellow club member Lachie Jackson about six weeks ago started a series of events that lead to the partial dispersal of a deceased estate in Melbourne with a cache of Crossley and Ford Model A parts.

Lachie said I should call a chap in St Leonards, who then gave me another number to call about the Crossley parts.

This chap, who was cleaning out the house for the brother of the deceased, advised that I had first right of refusal for the items retrieved and a meeting was arranged the following weekend.

The scope of what had been initially retrieved was extraordinary in the volume of Crossley, Ford Model A and other makes, and they had not finished clearing the property. An offer (a bit low) at this stage was influenced by the sheer number of items and the property had not been totally cleared out.

All went quiet until an ad appeared on Facebook for a Crossley 19.6 Vee shaped radiator, which sold very quickly to the UK.

Another inspection was arranged by the vendor for a job lot price but I had to admit that I did not have the capacity to transport and store the multitude of items and so I left it.

At this point I understand that a lot of the Ford Model A parts were sold, although I suspect only those usable parts were sold as several badly rusted items remained.

Another inspection was arranged, with the total numbers of items on display and the option to purchase items that were appropriate for our requirements. So I, my two sons and two Crossley friends went to review the items. A bit like a private swap meet actually, and we all came away satisfied with our purchases.

The original owner of the parts was a Crossley owner of a 19.6 sports tourer who I met at the Geelong speed trials in the early 1980's. He put me onto my second one-owner 15/30 Crossley, located at Colbinabbin and which had been converted to a farm hack, running on a combination of petrol (to start) and kerosene (to run).

The collection had the remains of at least seven vintage Crossley's with four 15/30's and three 19.6 models, as well as possibly parts from some veteran Crossleys. While a lot of the jewellery items had been stored in the house (as well an incredible amount of magazines etc) the majority had been relegated to outside storage and had suffered from the elements i.e. rust.

Interestingly a 19.6 chassis that the brothers owned had been cut in half as they could not agree with what to do with the chassis: sad.


