The 28 Buick Camper Trailer.

Some years ago, I made a briefly considered decision to borrow a friends vintage camper trailer and with this in tow behind my 28 Buick to attend the Kyabram Vintage Truck Muster.

The Buick has four-wheel external-band drum-brakes, all mechanical and adequate for the speeds and conditions of the day but marginal in today's traffic. Attention to braking is required at all times when driving.

The trailer towed easily and the outfit attracted much attention at the Kyabram Truck Muster and I and even Marion (my other half; not really a vintage enthusiast) enjoyed the experience albeit with a little trepidation relative to the outfits braking. A number of times during the trip the impact of the additional trailer mass upon the Buick's braking capacity was very obvious particularly when a "modern" entering from an intersection on our left failed to give way, no doubt on the assumption that we had <u>plenty</u> of space in which to slow down.

Even so the weekend was thoroughly enjoyable and the advantage of having one's own camper trailer to hitch up at will had become abundantly obvious.

At the time, I was working on my last project in the Philippines prior to retirement and the thought of using the Buick and a trailer combination more frequently in my "leisurely" years was constantly reoccurring during my daydream moments (I guess we all have those).

My thoughts were along the lines of: "that trailer I borrowed was exactly in keeping with the period and very functional though a little small. I Should build one almost the same but a little larger. If I build one though, the braking in traffic is likely to be dangerous. I suppose I had better not ".

Ruminations like this with a variety of departures and variations were recurrent but when I came across an old horse drawn trailer with vintage Buick artillery wheels and spring-sets (one useable brake drum included) I had to buy it "just in-case".

Retirement finally arrived by which time I had determined to have a camper and I set too in earnest to "copy" my friend's unit with modifications to suit my intended use. My big concern remained what I considered to be inadequate braking on the Buick when towing a trailer, which I had to admit would be heavier by a considerable amount than that I had borrowed and hence even more difficult to stop.

My thoughts turned to trailer brakes. Hydraulic override brakes I considered impractical to implement using the Artillery wheels and also too insensitive and with electrical brakes two issues were an impediment. Firstly, the Buick has a six-volt electrical system and secondly the axle and drum set that I had would not accept any of the electrical brake sets available at least not without modification. Nevertheless, I decided to examine this option in more detail and after measuring the I.D. of the one sound brake drum that I had, I found that this was precisely I2 inches, ideal to receive a I2-inch I2-volt electric brake set readily available on the net. I was aware that other issues would arise and modifications would be necessary but the decision was made and construction of the trailer commenced.

As earlier mentioned, the basic design followed that of the trailer that I had borrowed though of slightly greater length and width with provision for a small gas-electric refrigerator, storage for pots and pans a built-in gas barbecue a water tank and tool boxes. The Tail-gate doubles as a table when lowered and hatches at the front provide both ventilation and access to the refrigerator and storage and are readily fitted with fly screens as necessary. The trailer bed accepts very neatly a standard double bed mattress.

A canvas annex augments the outfit to make changing clothes etc much more comfortable.

In parallel with the construction of the trailer body framing and roof structure my attention was again directed to the brakes and the 6-volt system versus 12-volt brake requirement. I reasoned that it was desirable to have independent lighting in the trailer and that by providing a six-volt battery in the trailer this would provide the necessary power for this as well as (by connection in series) the additional power necessary to drive the 12-volt brake coils. (I had also attempted to locate a set of 6-volt brake coils which historically had been available but in this I was unsuccessful).

To control the brakes, I considered that a modern electronic controller would not be adaptable to my chosen (somewhat unorthodox) system and I then searched for a simple under-dash resistance controller of the type commonly used in the 60's and 70's (and in America much earlier).

I eventually located a suitable unit on eBay and ignoring its hydraulic section I connected the manual override lever via a spring directly to the foot brake arm beneath the floor of the car. Braking of the trailer could then be controlled either slightly in advance of, or slightly subsequent to application of the car brakes, depending upon the adjustment within the controller of the variable resistor. My preference was that braking of the trailer should be slightly in advance of or at least in conjunction with the application of the car brakes so that braking of the trailer should not add to the requirements of the car brakes in any way.

Naturally fitting the electrical brake assembly to the existing trailer drums was not as simple as hoped for as the brake electromagnet required an uninterrupted area of drum web to run against and its path fouled the timber spoke anchor bolts. The solution was to fabricate a 10mm disc with holes coinciding with the position of the aforesaid bolts such that the nuts were then recessed clear of the actuating magnet and coil. The said disc then provided the surface upon which the electromagnet ran and this was then affixed to the inside web of the drum using countersunk set screws.

The extent of modifications necessitated new stub axles and these I fabricated on my small 9" Hercus lathe. Dimensions were adjusted to provide a drive fit into a proposed 65×3 SHS axle replacing the original very heavy car beam axle. The stubs were then plug welded to the SHS.

To ensure that the backing plates of the new brake assemblies were truly square to the axle and stub axles the backing-plate mounting-cleat was turned as a disc with a recessed/counterbored centre hole. The recess then received a turned sleeve the Inside diameter of which was a drive fit over the SHS axle. The Sleeve was then offered up to the mounting disc, clamped and welded. Once fitted to the SHS all three principal components, Stub axle Mounting Plate and SHS Axle were unavoidably true to the required alignment of the brake assembly.

Electrical wiring of the brake controller on the car was quite simple. Bearing in mind that the chassis was retained as earth, a hot wire was taken direct from battery via a 15-amp fuse to the input of the controller then from the controller output to a three-pin plug mounted adjacent the number plate at the rear of the car.

On the trailer a three-pin plug connects with this and the "hot" wire passes then to the negative terminal of the trailer mounted six-volt battery (Note that the Negative on this battery is isolated from the chassis). From the Trailer Battery a Hot wire is connected to both Brake coils and the coils earthed to Chassis. No Current can flow until the controller on the car is activated by the brake pedal as the series Trailer battery is only in circuit when the controller activates and earth is maintained via the ball pull and a supplementary earth wire. There was a small risk of massive current draw (and burnt wiring) from the trailer battery to the car circuit during certain conditions of starting the car. A 50-amp rectifier diode was installed in the trailer supply line to eliminate that risk.

Blinkers, Stop and Tail lights were necessary on the trailer and I had previously installed a blinker system on the Buick. By providing two three pin outlets mounted at the rear of the Buick all connections necessary were provided for. Of course, a modern 7 pin outlet and plug could be used.

Lighting within the camper is of LED type globes mounted in vintage fittings so that power draw is very small and is provided for via an individual circuit direct from the on-board trailer battery mounted beneath the floor.

Charging the trailer battery was provided for by the not very elegant solution of providing a changeover switch to reconfigure an auxiliary supply from the car battery such that both batteries were in parallel.

In practice I have never had to use this feature as by placing the Camper battery on a trickle charger (attached to permanent readily accessible terminals on the trailer) at the end of each run, I have never depleted its capacity to a point where the brakes did not function.

Tuning the brakes was something of an exercise as the controller provided linear proportional control only on the six-volt portion of demand I.e., the brakes were supplied with at least six volts as soon as the pedal was depressed with the additional six volts being supplied proportionally depending upon the pedal position. With such large 12-inch brakes and a comparatively light trailer this resulted in the wheels locking on loose surfaces. The problem was overcome by fitting an additional 10-amp resister in the trailer brake wiring. In hindsight I suspect that it might be possible to operate the brakes successfully with only the 6 volts available from the car Battery but this has not been checked as rewiring would be necessary. The end result of the Brake installation has been very effective and I no longer have an elevated heart rate when approach-

somewhat better than that of the car alone as the trailer brakes when adjusted to my liking assist the vehicle braking.

Of course, had I chosen to convert the Buick to a I2-volt system in the first place the whole installation would be a little simpler however the presence of the on-board trailer battery has been a great benefit and I have been reluctant to change

ing traffic lights or stopped traffic etc. Adjustment of the controller has enabled the overall braking of the outfit to be




the Buick from its 6-volt origin in any case.

Rear view

Passenger side

Drivers side

Body and Engine numbers, stampings and plates or VIN number

Present this information to the permit scheme officers, they will do the appropriate paperwork for Vicroads.

Also remember to keep your old logbooks for 12 months.

PSYCHE PUMPS

Psyche Pump Station was built in 1891 by the Chaffey brothers to meet the needs of the irrigation settlement. Water was pumped from the Murray River to Kings Billahong and then distributed

Kings Billabong and then distributed throughout the area via a series of channels.

The steam-powered pump was replaced in 1959 by an electric pump.

The original pump house still stands at Psyche Bend, complete with the restored original pump, and is the oldest pump configuration of its type in the world.

The steam-powered pump will be operating on Easter Sunday.

LANGTREE HALL MUSEUM

Langtree Hall was built in 1889 and was

Mildura's first public hall. Originally in Langtree Avenue, over the years it has been used for a variety of purposes. Band recitals, concerts, operettas, and dramatic performances by local and visiting performers were an early feature. Langtree Hall is now situated at 79 Walnut Avenue and it was once called the 'Lyric Theatre'. Since being moved to its present location in Walnut Avenue, the hall has been restored and established as a privately-owned museum by the Cornell family. It has a stunning collection of district memorabilia. It is open Wednesday, Friday and Saturday 11am to 4pm


