

Spring is here and if it is anything like that last couple of days of August 19,20 & 21<sup>st</sup> then I cannot wait. Feel a bit more motivated to do something car wise. The past couple of weeks have been eventful, fun and more importantly with enjoyment of good company. As some members are probably aware that was a large auction of vehicles and bits in Harrow on the weekend of 9/10 August. Peter Corcoran and I were on the blower discussing an MG parts collection being auctioned the previous weekend when I stumbled onto the Harrow auction. Straight away my attention was drawn to the 1934 Singer LeMans on offer. More phone calls back and forth and Peter and I decided to make the trip down to Harrow for the viewing on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup>.

Having a nephew with his hands in most pies in the old car world comes in very handy and soon I was conversing with the acknowledged Singer LeMans guru who was able to do some great back-ground searching for me. At this stage there was only one photo provided as the main catalogue had not been published. I must admit at this stage I was pretty enthusiastic about the car. Over the next week I was able to find a couple of long forgotten photos of the same car from a Hamilton club rally in 1986 and later the same car that was a display car at the 1989 Hamilton Motor Show.



On Friday 8<sup>th</sup>, I took off from work and drove down to Peter's workshop in Alfredton. Upon arrival Peter had a clients vehicle all loaded up for delivery to Stawell. That vehicle just happening to be a Kougar-Jaguar Sports car. Based in style like a 50's Fraser Nash it is powered by a tuned straight 6 Jaguar engine which due to power-weight would provide a very lively

drive. After arriving and unloading the Kougar, I was treated to a viewing of a small selection of Peter's client's collection tucked away in an old mechanical business. One of those cars being an incredible recreation of the 1963 Jaguar E light weight 'Low Drag' coupe. The background of this beautiful car is very interesting. Car No.5 was delivered in May 1963 to Peter Lindner, a German Jaguar distributor. After racing through the 1963 European season and with LeMans in-mind, the car was sent back to Jaguar with the instructions to make it the fastest Jaguar ever produced. The "low drag" turret was designed and the Jaguar Competition Department worked to extract all the power they could from the drive train. The car was returned in time for the 1964 Le Mans race. At Le Mans the E was providing a match for the Ferrari 250 GTO's with 270kph down the main straight before mechanical issues forced its retirement. Sadly a

few weeks later Peter Lindner was killed in the vehicle at Montlhrey, France. Impounded and held by French authorities for 10 years after the accident, after

release it was assessed as irreparable and held in storage in Germany. In 2007 the wreck was purchased for restoration into its original shell. After 7,000 hrs of



work the car was first shown in 2011. The body of the Stawell E Type was the prototype used to form the panels for the original car and is accurate down to the last rivet. A very rare wide angle head was secured and mated to the 'doner' E type series 1 engine. Every other fitting was exactly manufactured to replicate the original. A very spectacular looking car I can assure you.



So off we went again deciding we would try the Stawell – Dunkeld Road, which was great until it turned into ungraded dirt for most of the way. Thank heavens we were in a 4WD with an empty trailer.

On Saturday morning we headed off to Harrow to join the line of 'viewing' attendees awaiting the 11.00 am kick-off. After re-

acquainting ourselves with long term club member Geoff



Waters (Member No.112) we headed into the sheds to check out of prospective interests. In a true example of why you should always inspect before purchase, my enthusiasm quickly turned to disappointment. Although solid in photo appearance, the Singer had suffered poorly in storage with multiple body and other 'visible' issues. The drivetrain was also non-original and was post war in engine, gearbox and rear axle. Peter in the meantime had found a very nice pre-war chassis outside and had decided to have a bid on a Riley based racer re-creation. A little dejected car-wise (me) but loving the drives and company we headed off back to Ballarat and then me for Melbourne for the auction was on-line only on Sunday.

Sunday came and went with the usual 'auction fever or what I call 'stupidity' (my opinion only) with the eventual hammer price of the LeMans at \$23,100 + commission. If you could do the work yourself not an 'outrageous' price, but if it had to be outsourced, a basic estimate from Peter was 15-20k to get roadworthy. All the cars went for generous prices considering their condition but fantastic for the hospital/health care beneficiaries. For me a couple of Edwardian & 20's Headlights, Peter picked up the chassis.

The next weekend we repeated the trip down to collect our goodies. Peter's chassis was identified as a c1934 Riley 9 in excellent condition, perfect for his vision of a 1920's style GP car (when the children grow up). In Harrow we met up with Mark Roberts (son of Peter Roberts Member No.128) who had driven across from just outside Adelaide to collect some items he had won from Dennington's auctions which I had picked up for him, a minor 4 hr drive each way. Mark has a wonderfully original Rolls Royce 20 H.P with saloon coachwork by Mann Egerton. Originality down to the tools and owner's top hat in its case. I was lucky enough to have a ride whilst visiting Adelaide in April.

Although not ultimately successful in securing the Singer as I had really hoped, what was apparent was the life-time connections our Hamilton car club has given us. From kids of foundation/club members, here we are all in our 50's meeting up together from 2 states to pick up and exchange bits and pieces for our cars/collection. A bond that continues even though we have all settled in different locations with our own commitments but still following our family's passion after all these years. And even funnier — none of our kids being slightly interested! Oh well, can't win them all.

The National Road Transport Museum was established in Alice Springs in 1995. It has evolved into a major tourist attraction in this Central Australian City, complimenting the many scenic, artistic and cultural attractions of the region.

Major features include the Kenworth Pavillion with immaculate examples prime movers created over the years, a fine array of Bulldog Macs and many examples of vehicles that pioneered road transport across the nation such as Ford, Chevrolet, Dodge, International, Thames, Morris Commercial etc. etc.

Vehicles on display vary from well preserved examples to well restored and many more in varying stages of restoration or deterioration, depending on your perspective.

The is a comprehensive collection of Vintage cars including such marques as Rolls Royce, Buick, Studebaker, Chevrolet, Dodge and so on. It would be hard not to find something to suit your personal taste.


The Wall of fame recognizes more than 1800 individuals who have pioneered and developed the road transport industry over the years. Some Hamilton identities that I noticed were Bruce Marks, Ted Rowe and Terry Holmes. I am sure there are many more there duly acknowledged!

Close to the Transport Museum is the Old Ghan railway museum with the fascination history of the railway that pushed through via Oodnadatta, reaching Alice Springs in 1929. The new Ghan line was built west of the original track, replacing it in 1980 and extending through to Darwin.

There is a lot to see and do in and around Alice Springs and the Road Transport Museum is not to be missed!

#### **AUCTION AT HARROW – AUGUST 10**

#### (Peter Cay)

On Friday the 8<sup>th</sup> during lunch and coffee at our clubhouse there was a lot of discussion about the on line auction on Sunday the 10<sup>th</sup> at Harrow. Some talked of going for a look, but several members who had previously visited the property said 'buyer beware' as there were mismatched parts fitted to some vehicles and restorations were not very good.

I was keen to have a look on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> at the viewing time between 12 and 2pm. John Wilkens was also keen, so we made the trip the next day.

The front paddock which was the carpark was full of good, expensive cars which we spent time looking at on the way to the Auction display. Outdoor covered 2 acres, but we lost count of the number of sheds we looked through. John had to come back several times to round me up as I got held up talking to restorers.

We met some very interesting people from all over the State, mostly disappointed that nearly all the part restored vehicles didn't have parts to complete the job. Most were on shelves in boxes mixed with other parts.

The Singer Le Mans sold for \$25,000 and we were told beforehand that it had a Holden differential. A fairly original 63/64 TR4 Roadster sold for \$24,000.

Many genuine buyers were put off because they couldn't collect until the following Saturday. A Riley restorer from Wangaratta said it was not practical to travel all the way back with his tandem trailer.

A 1967 Jaguar 420 sedan 6cyl.engine, which had been in the shed for lots of years, 43,000 miles but no brake drums or shoes on left hand side, incorrect wheel on right hand side, sold for \$4,000. A red 1980's Jaguar sitting outside with Holden or Chev V8 sold for \$1,500 parts only.

I rang the auctioneer, Martin Evans, on Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> but he wouldn't release some prices as they were bought by resellers.

The 1929 Singer Boat tail sold to a person who left an opening bid of \$7,500 on the viewing Saturday – about 1/3 of value, probably because you couldn't start or run any vehicle.

The Auctioneer's advice was to register the day before the auction or on the day, have an open auction and bid and take goods on the day or organise to collect.

Agreed prices were very low on tools and farm gear and a lot of pieces which would normally have sold at an open auction went to scrap metal dealers, however their problem would have been support workers to run an open auction.

Although John and I thoroughly enjoyed the day we agreed an open auction would have had a better outcome, and more chance that we would have bought something we didn't really need, like the 1950 Austin Healy shell that John has a motor and gearbox to fit – but the Auctioneer wouldn't release the price as a reseller purchased it!







Classic Cars of 2050 Dennis Dawson

When we think of classic cars what comes to mind? To me mainly English, despite a well deserved reputation for short-comings on a number of fronts. I am also minded of those of European heritage and even the odd big American "Yank Tank". But what does the future hold for our grandchildren? Will they revel in the sublime pleasure of the raucous exhaust note, the smell of Castrol R; the idiosyncrasies of each make and model in their design, construction, handling, braking. The inherent pleasure and frustration of fiddling with some mechanical component during a lazy Saturday afternoon or Sunday? It would seem not. Bland and characterless electric seems to be the way of the future. Even in Formula One!!

If I can channel the words of that nutty professor, Julius Sumner-Miller, "Why is it so?" Perhaps because the advent of computers has led us to accept everything that will come in a box of like minded algorithms. And so, enter China.
