PAST EVENTS

Report AOMC meeting Saturday 26th August, 2023

The meeting was held at the Ballarat North Community Centre.

This venue was organised by Jenny Ure as was the catering team – well done Jenny and the team.

The meeting was chaired by Iain Ross – the vice-president.

Presentation by Nick Scarff who presented a synopsis of his thesis, a component of his Degree in Design. This focussed on advertising utilised by Brysons, importers of Jaguars. The message was that the cultural history of motoring was not widely recognised nor the impact that motoring had on our way of life. If we wished to continue to drive our heritage cars then this message needed to get into the mainstream thinking.

Presentation from Wayne Drew, President of the Ballarat light Car Club who spoke of the Club's foundation in 1949, and their activities over the years. An interesting aspect was their involvement with children as young as 12 driving in gymkhana type tests at their club grounds. This taught kids car control in a safe way, and enthused them to become members later on. The Club has a difficulty in that their club circuit is likely to be cut in two with a new access road into the airport, and without a circuit, the club will struggle without a reason to be.

Incorporations Act information – AOMC has sought legal and accounting advice, initially looks to be little effect for Clubs, but watch this space.

Cheque Books are being phased out by the Banks, so Clubs need to start making other arrangements.

Treasurer's Report. – AOMC has a healthy bank balance of \$342,611 and therefore sufficient funds to implement their strategic plans as developed.

VicRoads/Club Permit Scheme Report – Some 2,000 renewals for September have been sent out without log books. Can be resolved by attending a VicRoads office.

- 7. Morley Mill chimney can be seen with Exacto on it



A581 **Post-War Baby Austin Cars A30 – A35 – A40 (1952-1967)**

By Barney Sharratt. Foreword by James Hunt.

Published in 1988 192 Pages

The post-war baby Austin Car broke new ground as Austin's first chassis-less car. In this excellent book we follow its development from the initial A30 model into the later A35 versions. This vehicle's performance, reliability and economy led to many being used in motor racing – where they are still very successful. Pinin Farina used the same mechanical components to produce a completely different car in the A40 Farina, which was well ahead of its time as the forerunner of the modern hatchback.

The book also covers the post-war details of the Longbridge Factory and the designing of the A30 engine, an engine which would later become known as the "A– Series" and, after further development, would be the power unit for many millions of cars over the years.

The building and testing of prototypes is dealt with in detail, with the exercise to produce a small fibreglass sports car and the building of an aluminium A30 car. The company also experimented with a new two-stroke engine in an attempt to produce an A20 car, or true economy car, but the idea was shelved to make way for the new Mini.

There is also a chapter covering the vans, station wagons and utilities as well as the development of the Austin Healey Sprite roadsters and the Turner Roadster built from 1956 until 1962. The final chapter covers owning and the running of these cars in more recent times as classic cars. At the end of the book are five appendices covering: Technical Data; Production Data by the various models; Paint and Trim Colours; as well as English and Australian A30 Car Clubs.

This book may have been published in 1988 but, with the number of Austin A30/A35 cars in the VCCC, it was an important addition to our Library.

I have owned an Austin A30 since 2006, she became part of our family during a trip to Tasmania one school holidays. She arrived in Victoria a short time later on the Spirit of Tasmania complete with sea sickness tablets taped to her dashboard!!

She is affectionately named Thelma after her previous one lady owner and sits all tucked up under her blankets in the corner of the shed surrounded by various other friends with 4 and 2 wheels. She starts first time most times and enjoys trips around Lake Wendouree in the sunshine.

Her specs are 1954 Austin A30 with original 803cc 4-cylinder engine

and 4 speed gear box, drum brakes all round and has done 43,000 miles from new. She has red leather seats that still have the distinctive leather smell all those years later.

Despite her age she still turns heads and gets called "cute" everywhere we go. For some reason she has an occasional aversion to the Sturt Street, Gillies Street traffic lights intersection. When I joined the Club in September 2007, I did not own an historic vehicle. But that changed when I took delivery of my 1956 Austin A30 on the Wednesday prior to the 2008 Begonia Rally – and entered!

I bought it from Club member, Alex Martin who older members will remember. She quickly became named Annie - after my grandmother whose name was Annie Austin. What appealed to me was that she was original first and foremost, which is something I always said I would have.

She has lived in Ballarat all her life, but I have no evidence yet that she was actually purchased in Ballarat. The Austin dealers back then were Sam Ellis & Sons in Armstrong Street North, and the Service Agents were across the road – Caddy & Kerr Motors.



As production of the A30 series ceased in October 1956, Annie could very well be one of the last ever made. Her first registration was in early 1957 in Victoria.

Her first owner was a travelling salesman, who sold her 12 months later to a teacher at Urquhart Street Primary School, Miss Elsie Kirk, who had her for 25 years. Then, our new member Rod White, owned her for 10 years (he still refers to her as 'Elsie'!). Following a further 3 owners of short periods, she became mine.

We went to the Austin Nationals in Devonport in 2015 – that's where I REALLY learned all her quirks and foibles going around the hills of the northern regions of Tassie. 
Mum and Dad kept in contact with the original owners for 41 years and with Mum passing away last year, it's up to me to carry on with the Austin into its

Continuing the Brisbane to Broome Veteran Rally 2022 – Catrina Sargent Day 25. Derby to Broome 225kms (Thurs 11th Aug)


Our last days ride. It was overcast and blowing a gale. A really strong head wind. Off we set and it wouldn't have been more than 20kms when we spotted Andrew Repton and Michael Rock on the side of the road. Michael had the front wheel out of his 1910 Triumph. Another tyre gone. He was well on his way getting ready for his spare tyre arriving soon from his backup vehicle.

As we wound our way back onto the Great Northern Highway, we rode past the start of the Gibb River Road which travels some 700kms through the central Kimberley Plateau and is all dirt. Jeremy, Jess and the girls are planning to do this after Broome. It was interesting listening to other travellers who have done it. Two ladies had just done it in a Hiace van and only had 1 flat tyre, whereas you hear of broken axles, and major car and engine failures out there. Richard wants to do it on his Square 4!

Richard and I made our way to a pull in area with a large Boab tree for a cuppa stop and watched Andrew and Michael ride past, so they had sorted out the front tyre and were on their way again. We got closer to Broome and the traffic was becoming more constant. We stopped on the edge of Broome and took a pic of us with our bikes in front of 'Welcome to Broome' sign. We made it. Woohoo.

It was a tricky ride into Broome navigating cars, trucks, push bikes, scooters and pedestrians. I rode into Broome with Richard following on the GEM with Mum and Dad behind in the van. I proudly navigated to the caravan park, only to discover I was at the wrong caravan park! We looked at the map and made the wise decision to follow Richard to the correct caravan park.

It was extra busy around Broome with the rodeo and cup on this weekend. We sorted out camp and then rode to Matso's, a rustic



We made our way back to Matso's for some finger food, local beers and rally end wrap up. We stayed in Broome for another week and made the most of it. Helicopter flight to Willie Creek Pearl Farm for a land and boat tour followed by lunch, we did go to the rodeo which was "a cultural experience" to quote Richard. We watched the Staircase to the Moon, which is a natural phenomenon that occurs when a full moon rises over the exposed tidal flats over the Bay, and only happens 3 nights a month between March and October.

We went to the old lighthouse which was nestled on the most brilliant red soil and a short walk from the water's edge which was dotted with rock pools that would fill with clear sea water and making a private spa as the tide came in. We had a dip in one of these rock pools which had a lookout over the most amazing turquoise sea. Watching the tidal times, we walked along the sandy dune to Coconut Wells made our way to the mouth of the lagoon. She always wanted to drive across the Nullarbor, and after talking to lots of people, decided to go down to Port Hedland then inland and down to Kalgoorlie to the Nullarbor and across. What a trip for Margaret.



Mum and Dad were debating whether to go down the centre but ended up following a lot of the route we did in reverse and then down to Ballarat. Ian and Jenny did a similar trip to Ararat and they were all having trouble with accommodation. All booked out. The country seems to be awash with Australians exploring their own country, in the biggest caravan they can afford.
