Cover Story – how I came by such a nice car - purely by accident!

I came by this car via a very good friend who could not change the tyre on the rim.

He asked me to do it and after I fitted the wheel, it was still very loose so I thought that the wheel bearing needed adjusting. Big mistake taking the bearing cap off as the locking nut was blue and a number of ball bearings fell out on the ground. Further investigations led to discovering that the stub axle was almost cut through in two places. Not being a GMH man, I had to deal with a king pin for the first time, having to remove and refit it. My nephew, Wayne Feltham at Nimrod Engineering welded the stub axle and it was machined by Peter Hughes from Status Engineering. Surprising to me, a complete bearing set was available from Ballarat Bearings off the shelf.

After I had it all back together, I took Joy out to my friends as well and the owner said "Felth, you need this car", to which I replied, "no, I play with Jaguars". Then Joy said, "I like this" and it quickly turned out that we bought the car. As it was made the same year Joy's Mum was born, it has gained the knick-name of Gladys.



Previous history from the owners was that it was restored in 1970 and driven daily until 1980. The original owner was a WW2 veteran with shrapnel in his back and could no longer get in and out of it after 1980. His father owned a new one when he was a boy.

Luckily it was stored under cover for forty years so it only needed minor repairs to get back on the road. It has come with many spares - some have been used. A new headlight switch was fabricated by Peter Hughes, the Speedo was checked by Benny in Winter Street, the brakes needed adjusting and pivot points lubricated. This made an immense improvement to the ability to stop. A stop light switch was found, exactly the same as some old motor bikes. New tyres finished the project and it has completed two Naked Radiator runs.

While I had driven cars with conventional tyres and some steering wheel movement, it has taken some getting used to bump steering, having an accelerator pedal between the clutch and brake pedals, and bouncing down the road like a water bed. (It does not have shock absorbers). A new life experience driving this vehicle.

However, Joy likes the car and the car runs, so it is here to stay.

Federation of Veteran, Vintage & Classic Vehicle Clubs Inc. Delegate's Report

The latest Quarterly Delegates' meeting was held Saturday 6th May in Bendigo and was hosted by the Veteran Vintage & Classic Club of Bendigo, who provided lunch and afternoon tea. The Club was introduced and provided some of the history behind their clubrooms and facilities.

It started in 1984 when the Club purchased a trailer for use by members, and there was nowhere appropriate to store it. Land was secured and the original clubrooms built, followed by a mechanics pit, a sandblaster and other machinery. Over time there was an extension (to the front) to increase the meeting capacity, then the kitchen. As the Club has evolved, they added a hoist (which needed an extra shed) which has recently been replaced with a new hoist, together with various machinery and workshop tools. This is all in and around the existing building.

There are also now two additional sheds, one which holds the tandem car trailer (in its 3rd iteration now), together with barbeque trailers, tables and chairs etc, and the other is the Swap shed which houses all the equipment needed for the Bendigo Swap.

The Bendigo Club manages the Bendigo Swap on behalf of the Federation and shares the proceeds, which they have been able to put to good use for the benefit of their members.

It was good to be able to meet and mix with the Bendigo members in their own environment who are involved with the Swap.

The meeting included all standard Agenda items and finished with afternoon tea before heading for home. The items I have identified as worthy of reporting are as follows:

Picnic Days:

All the completed picnic days from March were reported on. There was also an update on the fundraiser in support of Peter MacCallum Cancer Foundation. From the collection tins returned so far, and other donations, currently we have collectively raised \$3,500, and this figure will increase as more tins are returned and other events finalised.

The next one is the biggest Picnic Day - at **Marong** (Bendigo) being held on Sunday 27th August, which is also the start of the Federation Tour (see below).

Bendigo Swap – **11th/12th November 2023.** All outdoor sites are now booked out, all indoor sites in the BEC centre are booked out, there are a few remaining in the REC centre. The feature in the middle of the BEC centre this year will be Barn Finds or Survivor Cars (carried forward from last year). Advertising will commence soon, and flyers are now available (I have left some at the Clubrooms, if you would like some to distribute around let me know). There will be no show and shine this year.

Volunteers – the request for volunteers has arrived at the Clubs. Shifts are for 2 hours (you can do multiple shifts), for this you will receive a weekend pass, a volunteer badge, and a \$10 refreshment payment. Plus, the VCCC also receives \$20 per shift. There are shifts available from 8am Friday through to 1pm on Sunday, please let Nancy know if you can spare a few hours. The first draft of the rosters will be complete in July so get on it. A reminder that volunteers are important as the Swap is owned by Federation, run "by the movement" and "for the movement", with proceeds used to fund Federation activities and therefore return to the historic vehicle movement as well.

Federation Tour (2023)

Federation Tours are for the enjoyment of member clubs and their members, this year is the *Open Tour* (for vehicles 25+ years old) and will be the "North West Tour", starting at Marong Picnic, heading to Kerang, Swan Hill, Echuca and Shepparton, visiting and supporting areas affected by the recent floods in Northern Victoria. Further information and entry forms available at <u>www.federation.asn.au</u>

Trophy Donations & Capital Grants – there was an application from Hamilton Club for a trophy for their King's Birthday Long Weekend rally in June, which was approved. Gippsland Historic Automobile Club was successful in applying for a Capital Grant to support the purchase of a laptop, and Dandenong Valley have enquired for a Capital Grant to purchase banners, which needs some further information and pricing.

AHMF (Australian Historic Motoring Federation) – Newsletters are becoming frequent - titled "Spoke'n'Hub Torque", previous editions can be viewed on the Federation website (under the Affiliates tab). if you have any articles that you think would benefit the movement, please send them in.

There has been an interesting publication put out by OHA (Operating Heritage Australia) in relation to emissions and calculations of comparatives.

National Heritage Motoring Day – the aim is to be seen and heard, please feedback any reports that show the movement in a positive light.

There has been a request for AHMF to again take up the sharing of information when the event of a stolen vehicle or collection occurs.

There has also been a request to regenerate the services directory that was published many years ago by the VDC, the most recent request being for someone to restore gauges (for pressure equipment).

ATO Activity – the Treasurer was asked for an update and advised that although the ATO have continued to publish not-for-profit news, the focus since August last year has been many and varied, but little regarding the new requirements. The latest edition stated that with the new reporting requirements coming into effect 1 July 2023, this provides a timely opportunity to review purpose and activities, and those with an active ABN will be required to lodge an annual self-review return to access income tax exemption. It goes on to say "we're currently designing the return that will need to be lodged, from 1st July 2024, for the 2023-24 income year." This is not too much different to the advice the ATO issued in August last year where they said "we're currently developing the administrative infrastructure to make lodgements quick, easy and simple. This will include how the form is designed, collected and used. We anticipate developing new guidance that will provide clear examples of reporting requirements and transitional arrangements that may need to be put in place." So still a work in progress, and no clearer for Clubs that may need to alter the way they keep records from 1st July 2023.

Federation Website

BLUEBIRD AND THE DEAD LAKE

June, 2023

The Story of the Strangest Record Ever Won! By John Pearson 188 Pages

Published in 1965

This book is the detailed story of Donald Campbell's Land Speed record at Lake Eyre, South Australia in 1964. The story is that supreme rarity - a story of heroism that is frank about its hero, and a true respect of events which reads like a thrilling adventure story.

A salt lake in the dead heart of the South Australian desert; an aborigine's curse; a wife who had to watch her husband risk his life day after day; the memory of a crash nobody mentions and never forgets; and a last chance to snatch a land speed record after nine years of disaster - these might be the ingredients of a novel. In fact, they form the background to the actual drama of Donald Campbell's successful fight for the land speed record at Lake Eyre in July 1964 in his Bluebird CN7 car at 403.10mph.

Prior to this record attempt, the existing record at 394 mph had been set by John Cobb in 1948. Since then, Craig Breedlove had reached 412mph in a jet-propelled car with three wheels. But Breedlove's speed had not been a world record. At that time the Federation Internationale d'Automobile in Paris

was still refusing to recognise jet propelled vehicles for land speed records. Only a car like Bluebird, driven

through its wheels, was eligible. This was to change years later.

Prior to each run of Bluebird, an Australian Elfin Racing Car was used for high-speed testing of the lake's surface. Chrysler Valiant cars were also used at up to 90mph on the service track parallel to the main Bluebird track during each test run.


In addition to bringing his Bluebird CNT car to Adelaide, Donald Campbell had also brought out his ten-year-old Bluebird K7 boat. It was decided to try to be the first person to achieve a new land speed record and water record in the same year. The Bluebird Hydroplane was taken to Lake Bonney, near Barmera in South Australia, but only achieved 216 mph as the lake was too small. This occurred on November 23rd 1964. They then took the boat over to Lake Dumbleyung in Western Australia where a new world water speed record of 276.33 mph was achieved on December 31st 1964. This part of the story is not in the book, but all the details are on the internet.

This very interesting second-hand book was donated by an ex-Club Member for our Library, and, in it were 4 photographs attached. The first was a signed black and white photograph of Donald Campbell; the second is a photograph of the Bluebird Hydroplane boat at Lake Dumbleyung with a Valiant station wagon; the third is a photograph of a commemorative sign for Donald Campbell CBE for the K7 Bluebird Project for fifty years 1964-2014 in Australia. The final photograph is of the metal plaque at Lake Bonney.

After leaving Australia, Donald Campbell took his Land speed record car and hydroplane back to England to



prepare the boat for another water speed record on Coniston Water - a long lake in the English Lakes District. His father, Sir Malcolm Campbell, had been the holder of both land and water speed records in the 1930s. During the summer of 1939 Malcolm Campbell had set a new water speed record of 141.74 mph using a number of Bluebird Hydroplanes over the years.





At 8.42 am on 4th January 1967, world speed record breaker Donald Campbell commenced an attempt on Coniston Water to break his own Australian water speed record of 276.33 mph On the first of the two obligatory runs Bluebird K7 Hydroplane was recorded at an average of 297 mph. On the return run at a speed estimated to be in excess of 320 mph Bluebird soared into the air, somersaulted and crashed, disintegrating on impact with the water surface. Donald Campbell died in the impact.

At Holker Hall, near Coniston Water, there is the large Lakeland Motor Museum, with the very extensive Campbell Exhibition, paying tribute to speed ace Sir Malcolm Campbell and his son Donald Campbell who, between them, had captured 21 world land and water speed records for Great Britain.

<u>Postscript</u> - On September 29th 1952, travelling at 206mph on Loch Ness in Scotland, in another attempt to gain the world water speed record, John Cobb also lost his life after holding the land speed record of 394 mph achieved in 1948. There is a John Cobb Memorial Cairn on the edge of the Loch Ness 3.5 miles from Drumnadroicht. <u>Ron Gay</u>

THE 1937 PACKARD 115 C

From an early age I remember my old Dad saying Packard motor cars were the best. This was during the latter stages of WW2 when private cars were almost non-existent on our roads. Petrol was unavailable to private

motorists and their cars were put in their garages "on blocks," unusable because of the lack of fuel. And there they sat until after hostilities ended. Still my old Dad, remembering the early thirties, often spoke of his never to be realised passion, to own a Packard.

As we all know the war did end and with it came car manufacturers bringing out their new models. A lot of these were no more than "prettied up "pre-war models and as a ten-year-old at the time, cars were 'my thing". I lived and breathed them. To see a new model parked somewhere in the street was a cause for great excitement. Of course, to be able to tell Dad I had seen a new Packard just made his and my day.

Time passed on with lots of new models of every make gracing our roads. And many years later the old car movement stirred into existence. Along with others it held more than a passing interest for



me having spied a 27 Packard 526 parked in the street. I managed to talk the owner into selling it to me and so my ownership of a Packard came into being in 1967.

About this time the Vintage and Classic Club was formed in Ballarat presenting opportunities for the Packard to be used, running up many enjoyable miles. A workmate friend told me his uncle in Bendigo had a 37 Packard which he wanted to sell. Of course, I was interested; who wouldn't be?



Off to Bendigo to check this out and there was a very nice straight 37 115 C, painted grey, standing in the shed. Well, I just had to have it and we drove it home to Ballarat 70 odd miles away, my second Packard! So, when the rallies came around, I had the choice of either car.

One of these rallies was through Central Victoria passing through a country area called Bridgewater. This is where things got interesting as in the instruction book of the '37 was the name A H Denhert, Memsie Estate, Bridgewater. With one or two queries we were able to find this estate and drove the Packard onto the property. The car was immediately recognized by its former owner who went on to say its original colour was Iridescent Bronze.

Mr Denhert went on to tell me it had been ordered from the USA. He had gone to the docks in Melbourne to see it, still in its crate, placed onto the wharf, fitted with its wheels, fuel, oil, battery and driven home to Bridgewater!

The car was probably used for going into town and other farming type duties, eventually being traded on a new Mercedes Benz in the forties or fifties.

The next owner was Mr John Filby who owned it for a number of years until I came along. It seems its main use during his ownership was to sit in it and watch the local football. At this stage it was registered 75 333 with enamel plates.

Since that time, I have enjoyed my years of ownership of the Packard. The comment I had from Mr Denhert about the car's original colour gave me the vision of returning it to that colour. Unfortunately, I was unable to find a sample of the original until I removed the radiator mascot revealing what I was looking for. Actually, that mascot can only be removed if the radiator is out.

I did take a bit of licence deciding to colour the wheels, bodyline and luggage carrier in a complimentary darker colour. An artist friend selected the final colour, being an expert in what colour ties in with the original bronze. I am pleased with the result.

The original interior leather upholstery is still in good presentable condition although the carpets have been replaced.

As things stand at the moment, and at age 87, I feel some 'downsizing' is in order. That is if I am not to leave my "estate" in a total mess for my two children to sort out!! So, and speaking of Packards, my 27 526 has gone to new owners in South Australia.

If and when the '37 goes, I hope its new owner will get as much pleasure from it as I have done. (See page 14 for sale details)

Long live the Packard.


