

He was a very talented panelbeater and specialised in car restoration. This was the beginning of life around cars, especially V8's. We bought a house, married and had children; and not particularly in that order. We moved to Mount Gambier as our three children were about to start school. Cars were a big part of our life and Peter



Brock was our idol. Our family car was a VK Brock Commodore and the new model Monaro. My son, Brad, has restored the Brock Commodore and it now belongs to him.



After 19 years, and separating from my husband, I traded the Monaro in for a Barina (yes, you read that right). I found a hair dressing job on the internet, packed the Barina and, with my 15 year old son, we moved to Clare, not really knowing anyone. Within a year I traded the Barina in on Brutus, my beautiful black, VE SSV manual V8 Ute. Many years later I traded that up to the VF Maloo.

I opened up my own salon in Clare within 2 years and one day Michael Smitham walked in the door looking for a haircut. We moved in together after 4 months and married within 18 months. We relocated down to the Fleurieu 3 months later. I sold my salon in Clare and purchased Harbor Hair in Victor Harbor.

At some point Michaels dad decided to have a farm clearing sale but didn't tell us. I did not have enough cash to keep either the FJ Ute nor the FX Sedan in the family. After a few years I sold Harry to a farmer in Kangaroo Island who had lost his original '41 Chev Coupe in the 2019/2020 Kangaroo Island fires.

I purchased my dream machine, the '59 Cadillac from Classic Motor Studio in Totness immediately after selling the Ute. After having watched this car for two years, seeing it in the Bay to Birdwood (and talking to the owners about it), and subsequently being advertised in magazines and on-line, I had the funds to buy it.

Over the years our collection of vintage clothes and costumes has grown. We have a room in our house dedicated to our hobby. We love dressing up in the 50's/60's era, getting into character and stepping back in time. Our biggest thrill was winning the 'Best Dressed Couple' at the National Vintage Fashion Awards at the Geelong Revival last year.

Rodger the Dodge has been sold. We will keep the Cadillac and have bought a 10ft Millard Caravan called Poppy. Life is about getting out there and having fun. So if you see a big white 19ft Cadillac towing a little 10ft caravan with a long line of traffic stuck behind it, it is probably just us heading off on a mini break.



Michael's Story

Born as one of the last baby boomers at the end of 1964, I grew up on a mid-North farm near the then almost ghost town of Hart, just north of Blyth. I was the eldest son and child of three in a farming family that grew wheat, barley, sheep and eggs. Fortunately the last milking cow had departed when I was two. In the area, and nearby towns, a common sight in the 1960's and 70's were vehicles of advancing age, from all categories. Cars, utes, motor bikes, trucks, tractors etc. As long as I can remember I loved all things historical/vintage/retro, ESPECIALLY CARS.

As I waited for age to allow me to get my license I promptly started to save, over two years, my meagre farm hand wage in Year 12 and the first year home on the farm (a terrible drought, lucky me). In December 1981, for my 17th birthday, I picked out a car that I wanted but Dad would not let me have it as he thought it far too old, it wasn't Australian and that as I was hopeless with mechanics, he stated with conviction that I would be stuck in the middle of nowhere one day even with the help from the RAA. So, I had to settle for a 1975 Valiant Regal not the '64 Vauxhall Cresta that I had wanted. The Valiant was the last model BEFORE Regals automatically came out with Air-Con with the salesman pitching that it was the last model with 'springs in the seats'. But I loved that car. Poo brown in colour with a cream vinyl roof and the Chrysler emblem standing on the bonnet.

But being 'Frank Spencer' on the farm was much too hard a job for both myself and my father and I moved to Adelaide at the beginning of 1984 to begin a teaching degree. In Adelaide my beloved Regal suddenly became very thirsty and was traded for a 39,000km, 5 speed 1981 Corolla. Goodness, what a size difference.

And petrol saving! That car did an amazing job of city and country driving. Sold 5 years later, nearly 200,000, it never broke down. In 1989 it was replaced by a 1988 Toyota Seca as I had rashly got married too quickly the year before. I still; however, dreamt of a Classic Car.



In 1992, happily wifeless and with no Toyota Seca, my father encouraged me yet again to NOT get a classic but to be sensible so I purchased a 1984 Toyota Corona Avante. This was a great car, top of the range (ooohhh, an aerial that went up and down automatically/thick velour seats/aircon) but it made me restless. Luckily in 1993 my new fiance's old Mazda 626 blew itself up. She loved my new car and bought it. So, after a short search I found a 1960 FB Holden Special, white bottom and roof, dark blue middle. It had done 90,000m. When we got married in 1994 it was the groomsmen's car.



In the '90s I found myself travelling from Littlehampton to Wirrina Cove five days a week as a Reception Supervisor. My faithful FB was such a pleasure to drive but family members worried about 'the poor old thing'. I resisted modernising for quite some time but on the way home one night approaching midnight the electrics ceased to work while doing 50mph on the road next to the Myponga Reservoir. Sliding to a halt in the pitch black I realised the front of the car was diagonal across the lane with a headlight half a metre from the actual guard rail. After that episode I bought a 1988 Colt GSR from a car yard in Woodside. Turned out to be a lemon and broke down a lot.





Meanwhile my father had restored some farm vehicles; the Diamond T truck back to its cherry red and cream paintwork with its beautiful pine board tray, the Fordson tractor was back to its bright dark Royal Blue and Canary Yellow, and because he had been brought back from the Pinaroo Hospital in one like it in 1934, he had purchased an in pieces 1930 Oakland 8, a short wheel base limousine, a model that was so expensive to make at the time it helped the Oakland Car Company go bankrupt before the end of the depression. The Oakland 8 underwent a massive restoration. Its funny, I had no idea that years later it would be our wedding car and that it would end up in my hands. But Oakland happily resides with a brother-in-law in Clare Valley so he can be tuned, admired and safely driven on outings as he should be.

After the appearance of sons Connor and Rhett, the GSR had to go and was replaced by the loved ex –RAA 1989 TP Magna. My brother-in-law, and parents-in-laws families were into road trips so we ended up with a black 1996 Limited Edition Jeep Cherokee followed a few year later by the longer wheel base 2001 Jeep Loredo. Many fun family holidays kilometres were travelled but I still miss my classic. Along the way I bought a 1993 metallic black EB Ford Fairmont Ghia. The Ghia looked and felt wonderful, but was unreliable mechanically.

In 2008, while I was a house Dad, working part time and putting myself through the rest of my Uni degree, Connor and Rhett and I, found overnight that there was no female under our roof, a woefully inadequate new income that could not hope to service the large mortgage and my transport unreliable for us. So everything was sold, including the attractive Ford, I ceased Uni and took full time work in Kadina but, just before starting, I was asked to work out of the Clare office instead. I arrived with 3/4 of a house of furniture, \$750 in the bank and a 2002 metallic blue Holden Cruze for us boys (nicknamed 'The Little Blue Box'). At the end of the next year I met Fiona, and of course, the amazing Brutus. I greatly admired that VE SSV 6Sp Black Ute with black and red leather trim. But I fell in love with HER.

Cheating has always been a part of the game.

Motor racing lends itself to cheating and some of the greatest champions were guilty of it. It has a long history, too. In the 1932 Tripoli Grand Prix, the winner of the GP also decided who would be awarded a prize in the Italian national lottery (Libya was, at the time, an Italian dominion).

Piero Taruffi tells the story: "Two weeks before the race, 30 tickets were drawn and offered to a similar number of drivers.



The ticket associated with the winning driver would earn the ticket-holder first prize, and so on for the second and third prizes." Varzi, Nuvolari and Borzacchini were quick to see the potential and arranged with their corresponding ticket holders to split the prize money in the race and most of the first and second prizes in the lottery. Varzi and Nuvolari finished first and second, with a prize pool equivalent to \$2.8 million at current values. Nuvolari explained that verbal promises were made to other drivers to be cut in if they held back. Although a number apparently agreed, no money was ever distributed and strong feelings prevailed for a number of years. The most vocal protestor was Luigi Fagioli who used to threaten the defaulters before every race.

Did it sell? There have always been chancers, people who believe their car is worth considerably more than the prevailing rate. And as often as not, they get what they are asking. After all, as the old saying goes, there's one born every minute. While doing some research recently, I came across an ad in 1988 offering a Ferrari Daytona Spyder, the 365 GTB/4.

Admittedly, it was a desirable car: one owner in a dry US state, never damaged or in need of restoration and only months after the death of Enzo Ferrari. But "respectfully consider offers over \$2 mil-



lion"? And remember, these were 1988 dollars, worth approximately \$5 million today. It appeared for a few months as a full-page ad, so presumably the owner wasn't swamped with offers, respectful or otherwise. Also in the same issue, a 1980 De Tomaso Longchamp was offered for "around £18,000" while a very similar-looking 1980 Maserati Kyalami 4.9 Auto, "with all the usual extra's (sic)" was on offer for £17,000. These days, a mint condition De Tomaso should be worth around £34,000 (\$A63,400) while a Maserati Kyalami is worth around £45,000 (\$A84,000).

Finding names for modern vehicles becomes ever more challenging, and most have appeared, in some form, in years past. Did you know, for example, that the big-selling Aussie Mitsubishi Triton ute wears the same name as a much earlier predecessor.

Triton was the son of Neptune and was represented as a fish with a human head. It was also the name chosen by an Englishman, David Johnson-Webb, for his own sports

car. Small world! It used a modified Peregrine body in glass-fibre. The Peregrine, in turn, was the short-lived venture by Peter Pellandine, who was responsible for the Ashley and Falcon bodies (and about whom I have spoken before).

And did you also know that "fibreglass" is a registered trademark (technically owned by Owings Corning) and not a generic term?

And that's how the fight started... My wife made coffee for me this morning, and winked at me when she handed me the cup. I've never been more scared of a drink in all my life
